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WHO ARE THE MOONCUSSERS?

Contrary to some reports, the Mooncussers is not a band of wreckers who lie awake nights praying clouds will hide the great orb of the sky so that ships can be misdirected on to the shoals—although in the preparation of "Captain Oliver's Daughter", as members of the cast can testify, plenty of night work has been necessary.

The organization known as The Mooncussers was formed last June with the intention of filling a wide gap in Provincetown activities. Although the greater part of the town population is of Portuguese extraction and the town life is mainly laid on a Portuguese background, nothing, it seemed, in the way of keeping alive as well as founding new means of Portuguese self-expression has been done.

In fact, it appeared Portuguese was fast approaching the graveyard of obsolete languages, something school-children shunned from learning and elders, with a twinkle in their eye, picked out only lustier words and phrases to mix into their English.

The Mooncussers, however, were aware of a new and great medium for Portuguese self-expression which might be started in Provincetown—a theatre that would paint with the brush of the drama all the facets of the picturesque Portygee's life—the sea, the fishing industry, the social problems confronting the Portuguese, of which there are not few—the digging up of the treasure of Portuguese songs and folklore, always a favorite pastime of mooncussers—in brief, all those pressing, pertinent things close to the heart of most Provincetown residents which the rush of modern life seems to think unimportant and so has left far behind.

This does not mean The Mooncussers will confine their drama only to scripts in the Portuguese language. By no means. The wealth of cape material is so vast that at the organizational meeting of the group, the following policy was incorporated into the Constitution—"The group will produce throughout the year plays of vital interest to cape residents and preferably laid on a cape background." And so for our next production, probably near Thanksgiving Day, it is our intention of producing an evening of one-act plays of varied interest.
