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#### **PROVINCETOWN**

In 1004, Norsemen landed here, and later, Captain John Smith, Bartholomew Gosnold, and certain explorers from France. In November, 1620, the Mayflower anchored well up the harbor, and here, in this haven, was drawn up and signed the "Compact", a document which had, and still has, a great and significant influence on the people and polity of this now great nation.

Rich in historical interest; marked by many memorials of events of great importance in our history; beautiful in its land and in its sea views; blessed with the purest of sea breezes; with lovely winding roads; with many little jewels of glacially-formed lakes, Provincetown and vicinity are well worth the time and effort of a visit.

The Town is not large, is surrounded by "Province" or State land on three sides, overlooks a harbor second to none in the matters of beauty and safety, dominated by the Pilgrim monument, rising 390 feet above the sea, a landmark for all vessels passing up and down our coast.

Its dunes, its plains of glittering sand, its gleaming beacons of the night, its quaint and "Cape Coddy" dwellings, its narrow and oft-times crooked streets, its light and sunshine, combine to make it a Paradise for painters and etchers. Provincetown is easy of access. By train one can come any day in the year, and in the summer, a most beautiful sail across the bay from Boston, invites the city dweller to sights and experiences previously unknown.

The Town has an adequate supply of good water, electricity, plenty of Churches, and many educational facilities. Provincetown has many and useful Clubs, a Historical Society with a Museum full of objects of great interest to those who care for the relation of the present to the past. Among the collections, is one of great interest, presented by Commander Donald B. MacMillan, of Arctic exploration fame, a collection to which he will add as occasion permits Provincetown has an Art Association, sponsoring each year one or more exhibitions of paintings, etchings, drawings, and other works of Art. The people of the Town are hospitable, its hotels good, its public servants courteous, and everyone is ready to helpfully welcome all who come in the spirit of good-fellowship.

#### **CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

Article II. Objects and Purposes. The objects and purposes of this association shall be to promote and cultivate the fine arts, and to that end to establish and maintain for the town of Provincetown a permanent collection of paintings and other works of art. Also to hold exhibitions of paintings and other works of art and to promote the advancement of art by means of social intercourse between artists and those interested in the arts.

#### **MEMBERS**

## Forword

Three exhibitions will be hung during the 1940 season. The first two are chosen by juries. The third is an independent exhibition. Two juries have been chosen to select the works which are to be hung for the jury exhibitions. Exhibitors have a choice of indicating which jury they wish to submit their work to and no limitations are imposed upon the work submitted insofar as school or type of painting or subject matter is concerned.

The standards upon which work is judged for hanging are necessarily less rigid than those which are arbitrarily imposed upon artists who submit their work to more competitive exhibitions. No two juries ever judge alike, and if the work shown in the present exhibition is not consistently of a definite standard from a predetermined critical point of view it is not necessarily because the members of the juries do not have, individually, a high standard for themselves. They have the difficult task of choosing from many entries works which when hung will make for an interesting as well as significant and representative exhibition.

With few exceptions the paintings, prints, and sculptures are for sale. The gallery attendant will be glad to give full information about them and arrange for interviews with the artists in order to see other examples of their work. Portfolios of water colors and prints are available and may be seen by request.

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
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
