

Wharf Notes

Those who have been down to 83 Commercial Street in the last weeks—or more literally months—have perhaps wondered how an old dilapidated fish wharf could be transformed into a modern theatre. But they went away with the cheering picture in their minds of a little lady serenely sitting on a camp stool amid the din of hammering and unbelievable chaos, watching and advising 'till the dream in her heart became a reality for all of us. The patient smiling lady was Mrs. Bicknell, the President of the Wharf Players.

The Wharf Players are most fortunate in having as co-directors Frederic Burt and Helen Ware (Mrs. Burt), distinguished members of their profession. Mr. and Mrs. Burt are well known in Provincetown and are giving generously of their skill and ability both as actors and directors to make the season a success.

We cannot often enough express our thanks to our donors who have in the last two years made contributions to the Building Fund. In view of the actual realization of the theatre, we confidently expect a generous response when our subscribers and patrons are asked for contributions towards the liquidation of our indebtedness. Mrs. Melzar Chaffee, who is Chairman of the Finance Committee, is making every preparation for a general campaign for these funds, and she and members of her Committee will reach the public in the course of the next few weeks. Upon completion of the campaign, the theatre will make acknowledgment to all donors through these pages.

Our greatest benefactor has been Mr. W. E. Schrafft of Winchester, Mass., who, when it was found impossible to procure a loan of money to begin building operations, there being no security of substance but only of faith—came to our aid and offered Mrs. Bicknell a loan of the necessary funds. Needless to say it was promptly and joyfully accepted.

The plans of the theatre were drawn by Cleon Throckmorton, Technical Director of the Provincetown Playhouse in New York City, and executed in Provincetown by Mr. James J. Perry, contractor, and Mr. E. J. Rivard, electrician. Mr. Throckmorton further enhanced his generous contribution of services by spending the last two weeks with us supervising the completion of the building, installation of electrical equipment and designing the stage lighting and sets. He brought with him Mr. Louis Gazverde, who originally came to this country as Chief Technician to the Chauve Souris, to assist in the installation of the stage apparatus and building of the stage sets.

The iron work on the front of the theatre was forged by Mr. Joseph Ramos. The pictorial sign swinging over the front door was painted by Mr. Francois Verheyden after the original block print by Miss Blanche Stillson. Miss Blanche Lazzell did the printed signs.

From now on, of course, the "play is the thing" and our producing directors, Miss Ware and Mr. Burt, want to see material. For the present they are living in the Bandbox Studio at 595 Commercial Street, on the shore, and can be found at home any day around 4 P. M. to see all available actors, costumers, technicians and workers in every department of the theatre. They urge people of these inclinations, no matter how inexperienced, to present themselves. In addition they have personally offered three prizes of \$25.00, \$15.00 and \$10.00 for the best piece of individual acting of amateurs done during the season, regardless of size or type of part—awards to be made by the directors.

Mr. Arthur T. Aldis of Chicago and Provincetown has been the generous donor of two prizes to the authors of the best plays of the season,—\$100.00 for the best long play, and \$50.00 for the best one-act play with production (if possible). Since the announcement three weeks ago more than forty manuscripts have been received.

The costumes for the various plays in this bill were designed and made by Mr. Prentiss Taylor, Miss Allene Gregory and Miss Ann Hitchcock,


The subscription season will consist of four bills. The second bill is now in preparation and will be presented on July 29th, 30th, 31st and August 1st. It is planned to present a fifth bill to be known as "The Provincetown Follies."

The directors of The Wharf Players will from time to time bring various other entertainments to Provincetown. The first to take place will be a recital of spirituals by Paul Robeson, the Negro actor who starred in the New York production of Eugene O'Neill's "Emperor Jones." This will take place at the theatre on the evenings of July 22nd and 23rd. Further announcements will be made by poster.

The Directors wish to express their appreciation of the offer of co-operation made by the Art Association of Provincetown, and to urge their subscribers to become members of that organization and support its activities as well as our own. Membership is Two Dollars and is open to all.
