## Town places collection online for all to view

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PROVINCETOWN — It's no surprise that the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston has its art collection online, available for anyone with a computer and Internet connection to look at. Or that the Louvre in Paris has its collection on virtual display, too.

But now you don't have to drive to Provincetown and walk through town hall and its various offices, or go to the high school or Cape End Manor, or the Town Hall Annex to see the town's famous collection of art on display.

All you have to do is go to www.provincetowngov.org on the Internet, scroll down the left hand side of the screen and you can leisurely view the 300 paintings in the town's collection of art.

Provincetown is famous as an art colony, and it was former town clerk Stephan Nofield's idea to put the town's art online for all to admire.

Jim Zimmerman at the Provincetown Art Association and Museum, photographed the entire collection.

"Many museums are doing this now, but it is unusual for a town to have a collection of this size, certainly," said Stephen Borkowski, chairman of the art commission. Nofield started the project, "and we've fine-tuned it," he added.

"We don't have the outdoor sculptures on line, but we have just about everything else."

The artworks were donated to the town, sometimes by the artists themselves.

Jim Bakker, former gallery owner and independent auctioneer, who is a member of the art commission, said there is really no way you could put a price tag on this collection, it is that priceless. "I'm not aware of any other town that has a collection like this online," he said. And, if by the Charles chance Hawthorne paintings, that all the world can see on the walls of the town hall entry way, were to be offered for sale, "they would bring an awful lot of money."
