From the many mills that were on and near Millers' Hill, its name came. The home of the late Caleb Cook was located on the top, and is now owned by artist E. A. Webster. August 27th, 1873 Parallel Street

Messrs. Darcey's Miller Hill section is about done. It is the best graded piece of work in the whole street. It has been done in a thoroughly workmanlike manner. We wish the whole street looked as well, but are sorry to say there is a woeful contrast between this and other sections though we judge that this was one of the most difficult ever. Gen. Butler's land overlooks this part of the street, being one of the Company's best lots.
