Services were held Saturday afternoon at the Fisk Funeral Home, 12 Johnson Street, for James Lewis Dyer, 76, of 4 Gosnold Street, who died last Thursday in the Barnstable County Hospital after some years of failing health. The Rev. Harry Rogge, pastor of the Church of the Pines, Eastham, officiated and interment was in the new Section Cemetery.

Mr. Dyer was born in Provincetown, a son of the late Edward A. and Sophia Dyer and received his education in the Provincetown schools. For a long period he was employed by the Consolidated Cold Storage Company. For more than half a century he was an enthusiastic member of the fire department and retired eight years ago.

He was a member of King Hiram's Lodge, A. F. and A. M., Joseph Warren Royal Arch Chapter, and the Anchor and Ark Club where he was night custodian for many years. He attended the Church of the Redeemer, Universalist.
