Funeral services will be held at the Nickerson Funeral Home at 2 p. m. tomorrow for Louis Morris Snow, 90, who passed away at his home at 259 Commercial Street, early Tuesday morning after a long illness. Miss Violet Kochendoerfer, pastor of the Universalist Church of Provincetown will officiate, and burial will be in the family lot in Gifford Cemetery. A Masonic Service will be held at 8 p. m. tonight at the funeral home by King Hiram's Lodge. Calling hours will be today from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p. m.

He was born in Provincetown on May 2, 1872, the son of the late Elijah Olin and Mary E. (Morris) Snow. He was married to Mabel F. Cook who died in 1924.

Mr. Snow, a graduate of Provincetown High School, was a retired merchant and for many years operated E. O. Snow and Son general store until 1925 when it was sold to Miller and Co. He was employed by Miller and

Co. for 25 years as an employee in the Town Crier Gift Shop and as a printer in the Provincetown Advocate.

He organized the Amphion Orchestra in the 1890's and played the violin in the group for about 30 years. They played at many dances and social affairs on the Lower Cape. Mr. Snow also was a piano tuner, and had served on the Provincetown Board of Registrars for many years.

He was a sailing enthusiast and sailed in many races with the old Provincetown Yacht Club. In later years he had an interest in oil painting.

He was a member of King Hiram's Lodge, AF & AM, and was organist for them for over 40 years. He was the holder of the Veteran's Medal having been a member of the Masonic fraternity for over 50 years. He also was a member of Joseph Warren Royal Arch Chapter of Wellfleet, Anchor and Ark Club, Chequocket Chapter No. 200, Order of the Eastern Star, and Fraternal Lodge, IOOF, of Orleans.

Survivors include his two sons, Stanley C., and Morris G., both of Provincetown.
