The fish exchange will be operating from 9 to 9:30 a.m. daily except Sundays and holidays. The large board has been installed in the building and installation of four telephones for the use of fish buyers has been completed.

town to the highest bidder and it is expected that boats from other ports will be induced to come here to sell their fish, Mr. Finkel said. He also expected the exchange will attract buyers from other places.
