Railroad

Railroad matters are stirring lively up the Cape. We trust our interest will not wane here. We know it will not, for as we have so often expressed ourselves, the people of Provincetown are sufficiently alive to their own interests not to allow this scheme to grow cold but push it until we enjoy the advantages of railroad communication. We are happy to hear such good reports from Truro. That her citizens are ready to act. Let us not relax an effort. Now or never. Let nothing dampen our ardor. A strong determination which exists to conduct our business to better advantage with better results is sure of success. Let every man put his shoulder to the wheel, for we believe the time is at hand.

October 22d, 1873

A telegraph office is being built upon the western side of the depot and connected with it. The grounds adjoining the station and all the company's property, is being hardened with clay brought from Truro and Wellfleet.

- July 8, 1915 -

The 2:40 train from Provincetown was delayed by some horses on the track while coming across Beach Point last Friday. The horses belonged to a camp of gypsies who were ordered to move on the following day.
