His great ability and sound judgment made the cold storage plant prosper. It paid large and steady dividends, sometimes one hundred per cent a year. In that fine Provincetown air, he went on managing it for thirty years. He was a Methodist and his wife was a Universalist. Being broadminded, he gave liberally to his wife's church. Like nearly every other Cape Codder of his time, he was a strong Republican. For twelve years he was head of the water board. A founder of the board of trade, he gave the land for its building. This calm con-servative with much business acumen had quiet tastes, except that he cherished a magnificent moustache with the ends turned up. He died August 8, 1925 when he was nearly seventy-seven. Many Provincetowners must have good stories to tell about him.
