About the year 1850, some families moved off, and each year increased the number so that at the breaking out of the Rebellion, there were but two houses left, besides the school which was also used as a church, preachers coming over from town occasional—
ly and holding service. Nearly all of the houses were moved on scows and were placed at the western end of the town, on Gull Hill.

About the last building to be moved was the schoolhouse.
