Address is 16 Mechanic Street in field; 1-story, 2-bays wide, 3-bays deep; roof clad in wood shingles; interior concrete block chimney on north side; primary façade clad in clapboard siding and secondary façade is wood shingle; 3, 15-pane vinyl fixed windows flanked by inoperable shutters, 1 single-pane sliding window on south side; modern multi-pane vinyl doors and wood steps lead from Mechanic Street up south side to the rear of the buildings; historic studio attached to rear, but not visible
