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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings in the community.

8 Conant Street is a 2-story, 3-bay former sidehall dwelling, now multi-unit dwelling, with a rear ell. The gable end is fully pedimented with box cornice; large shed dormer in south roof slope of main section creates third story space; brick chimney at roof ridge in rear addition. The main entry has a 3-pane and panel door with storm, with flanking fluted pilasters and dentiled entablature; brick stoop. Two secondary entries on the south facade are accessed by wood stoops. Windows are replacement 1/1 DHS with wood surrounds. Deck across 3rd story formed by shed dormer. 2-story rear addition with 2nd-story entry accessed by wood steps. Shed wall dormer on north facade. Rear-most section is 1-story with large shed roof dormer on north roof slope.
