1 1/2-story, 5-bay; front-gable roof with shed wings; asphalt roof shingles; 2 interior brick chimneys; 8-pane fixed wood; 6/1 wood, 1/1 vinyl with inoperable shutters; 3/3 wood paired; front entrance is pane and panel wood with stained glass, slanted gable hood supported by brackets and wood storm door; north section is a massive 2-story contemporary addition with single-light wood awning windows and ground-level access to basement. On west side, vertical vinyl or aluminum siding, 1st floor wall made of tempered(?) glass with tiny ridges in it, fixed single-pane vertical windows and
