Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings in the community.

14 Standish Street is a 1-1/2-story, approximately 5-bay dwelling; side-gable roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles; partial cornice returns; 2 interior brick chimneys; exterior is clad in wood shingles with wood corner boards and trim; fenestration includes 2/1 wood DHS with wood surrounds, 2/1 vinyl DHS on 1st floor of front façade, 2/2 wood DHS in basement; entrance located in enclosed flat-roof vestibule on front façade near northeast side; pane-and-panel door accessed by wood steps with 1/1 wood DHS next to it; enclosed section has concrete block foundation; shed wall dormer on east roof slope; bay window on south facade with 1/1 vinyl DHS; basement entrance on east facade has panel aluminum door and metal awning.
