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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

1 1/2-story, 3-bay sidehall, faces north; asphalt roof shingles; 2 interior brick chimneys on west slope; gable dormer on west side with full pediment; fenestration includes 2/2 wood DHS with operable shutters and wood surrounds; current primary entrance is located on west side rear south and contains a pane and panel wood door with modern storm, flat hood with elaborate brackets and accessed by concrete and brick steps; original primary entrance is now suspended with no access and contains pane and panel wood door with modern storm, flat hood with elaborate brackets; attached 1-story, 1-car garage with flat roof and rooftop deck, drop siding, modern overhead garage door;
