A show like ours would, indeed, be interested in someone who is probably the only official Town Crier in the U.S. However, since our guests appear for 5 minutes or more, we have established a screening procedure to determine (guess, would be a more realistic term) what they'd be like on the air. This preliminary interview takes place in our 44th Street offices, at the convenience of the prospective guest.

WHO DO YOU TRUST? is a comedy-quiz program. Remuneration comes through the playing of the game. A guest can win anywhere from \$25 to \$200, and even more on certain days.

Being a low-budget, daily show, the only financial burden we can assume is to pay anyone who appears on the air, win or lose, \$25 for the time and trouble involved. We admit that, while this amount might be adequate for local people, it hardly covers transportation, twice, between New York and Provincetown.

We can't ask that Mr. Snader make a special trip to NYC for this preliminary interview; we can only assure you and him that if such a trip can somehow be arranged, he will be given every consideration.

At the risk of being disloyal to WHO DO YOU TRUST?: it seems to me that CBS's WHAT'S MY LINE? would be interested in such a unique occupation. And they have the budget for it.

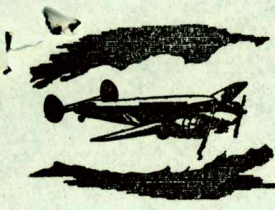

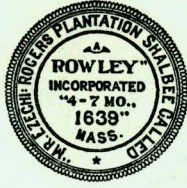



Mr. Grogan has been involved in theatrics for many years. As a youngster during the depression of the 30s he traveled from place to place singing, for among others, the Atwater-Kent Foundation. In 1933 he was runner-up to Thomas L. Thomas, for the coveted position of winner in the Atwater-Kent, New England, New York, and New Jersey Song Contest.

Mr. Grogan has for many years been active in benefit and church type programs. He was often the featured solist at among others, St. Bernard's Church in Fitchburg.

Mr. Grogan has most recently been associated with Mr. Howard Carr and his revolutionary Computer-Artist-Robot II, promoting the many uses for computer-painted art.

Prior to that time, Mr. Grogan was associated with AR-DEE Speciality Advertising of Keene, N. H.

When asked why he had applied for the position as Town Crier, Uncle Jim replied: "This position offered an unusual opportunity to apply the techniques of individual advertising to a definitely unique community. The people of Provincetown are warm and friendly, and as their emissary to the summer tourists, I plan to develop an extension of this warmth which will not only sell Provincetown to the tourists but which will also sell the people of Provincetown to them."

Town Manager Michael Botelho, commenting on the appointment of Mr. Grogan as Town Crier, stated that "The Town Crier must be a warm and friendly fellow, anxious to help a lost tourist, give directions, and discuss folklore. Mr. Grogan has the personality and the knowledge necessary in this position. I am confident that he will be an excellent Town Crier and be with us for many years."

An emergency meeting was held in the Town Manager's Office on Monday, June 28, 1971, to settle several matters, some personal in nature. Present were all members of the Board of Police of Selectmen, and Chief/James Meads.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss disagreements between Selectman White and Chief Meads in reference to Police work in front of Town Hall, and to avoid any further trouble of a personal nature. Differences were settled at this meeting.

Mr. James Grogan, Town Crier, was also called to this meeting to answer to reports that he was soliciting funds; a fee from people who snap his picture in uniform. Mr. Grogan agreed that this practice would not continue. (The conditions for the position of Town Crier allow him to accept fees, but not to request them.)

Town Treasurer Jeannette Segura had mentioned to Mr. Perry, Temporary Town Manager that the Town is short on cash, the tax rate for 1971 had not yet been set. Assessor John Corea was called in, and mention was made that Town Manager Botelho had planned to go along to Boston to get the tax rate set at the Bureau of Accounts. The Selectmen, under the circumstances, voted unanimously to send Temporary Town Manager, and authorized Assessor Corea to set the date for the meeting in Boston. (Wednesday, June 30, 1971)
