MONDAY, FEBRUARY 14, 1921

Barnstable, ss.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Provincetown,

in the County of Barnstable, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified to vote in elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Monday, the fourteenth day of February next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To act upon the reports and recommendations of the Town Officers and Committees.

Third. To see what action the town will take to widen the sidewalk in front of Town Hall.

Fourth. To see what action the town will take to erect and maintain a street light on Young's Court near the premises of George E. Rich and appropriate money for the same.

Fifth. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to help maintain the services of a nurse and the

same be expended under the direction of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the Visiting Nurse Association.

Sixth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for and to elect a Director for the Cape Cod Farm Bureau, as authorized by Sections 1 and 5, Chapter 273, Acts of the Massachusetts Legislature of 1918.

Seventh. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of a memorial to commemorate the services and sacrifices of the soldiers, sailors and marines, who served the country in war.

Eighth. To see if the town will erect and maintain a street light on Pleasant Street, between Bradford and Commercial Streets, and appropriate money for the same.

Ninth. To choose the following Town Officers on one ballot:

- A Town Clerk and Treasurer for one year.
- A Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for three years.
- One Assessor for three years.
- One Member of the School Committee for three years.
- Three Trustees of the Public Library for three years.
- One Member of the Board of Health for three years.
- One Water Commissioner for three years.
- One Auditor for one year.
- One Tax Collector for one year.
- Three Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber for one year.
- A Tree Warden for one year.
- Five Constables for one year.

Also to vote "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following question, "Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

Tenth. To see what action the town will take to provide suitable headquarters for the American Legion, Post No. 71, and appropriate money for the same.

Eleventh. To see what action the town will take towards

requesting the Selectmen to revise the rates for the use of Town Hall.

Twelfth. To see what action the town will take, if any, to grade and harden "Priscilla-Alden" Road and appropriate money for the same.

Thirteenth. To see what action the town will take to erect and maintain a street light on Mechanic Street near the premises of Antone D. Perry, and appropriate money for the same.

Fourteenth. To see what action the town will take to give the use of the Town Hall free of charge, to any public school, or any class in any public school in Provincetown, for entertainments and rehearsals for said entertainments.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to defend, compromise or settle any suit that may be brought against the town during the present year.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

Seventeenth. To raise and appropriate by ballot such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the current expenses of the town and matters voted on at this meeting.

In pursuance of the foregoing warrant, the inhabitants of the Town of Provincetown, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, met at the Town Hall on Monday, the

14th day of February, in the year 1921, and were called to order at 9 o'clock by Louis A. Law, Town Clerk.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. J. E. Montgomery. Frank Chase was appointed Ballot Clerk. Myrick C. Young, Fred H. Dearborn, Harry E. Simmons, Harry L. Eastman, and Louis M. Snow were appointed Tellers, and were sworn in by the Town Clerk. John R. Smith was appointed to act as Town Clerk during election.

Article First. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

George F. Miller was elected moderator and sworn in by the Town Clerk.

Article Second. To act upon the reports and recommendations of the Town Officers and Committees.

It was voted to act upon each of the Selectmen's recommendations separately. The recommendation of the Selectmen of \$409 for interest on Trust Loans was accepted.

The recommendation of the Selectmen of \$1800 for interest on Demand Loans was accepted.

The recommendation of \$100 for Memorial Day was accepted.

The recommendation of \$200 for Insurance on School Buildings was accepted.

The recommendation of \$1200 for Police Department was accepted with the Amendment that the salary of the Police Officer be \$3.00 per day.

The recommendation of \$3000 for Street Lights was accepted.

The recommendation of \$100 for the care of Veterans' Graves was accepted.

The recommendation of \$5000 for Salaries of Town Officers was accepted with the following amendment, "and the compensation of each Selectman shall be \$30.00 per month; each Overseer of the Poor shall be \$30.00 per month; each Assessor shall be \$40.00 per month, said \$40.00 per month

not to be in addition to the amount provided by statute, and these salaries to be for the year 1921."

The recommendation of \$2500 for Miscellaneous expenses was accepted.

The recommendation of \$500 for Moth Extermination was accepted.

The recommendation of \$5390 for Deficiencies of 1920 was accepted.

The recommendation of \$2000 for a Reserve Fund was accepted.

The recommendation of the Overseers of the Poor of \$4500 for Outside Poor, \$1500 for Town Home and \$2000 for Mothers with Dependent Children was accepted.

The recommendation of the Engineers of the Fire Department of \$1750 was accepted and it was voted that the Selectmen be requested to make the salary of the Chief of the Fire Department \$100.

The recommendation of the Superintendent of Streets of \$8241 was accepted.

The recommendation of the Trustees of the Public Library of \$800 in addition to the Dog Fund was accepted.

The recommendation of \$2000 by the Board of Health was accepted.

The recommendation of \$500 by the Cemetery Commissioners was accepted.

Article Two was then laid upon the table.

Article Third. To see what action the Town will take to widen the sidewalk in front of Town Hall.

It was moved by Mr. Smith that a committee of seven, including the Selectmen, be appointed by the Moderator to take into consideration the feasibility of widening the sidewalk on the south side of the Town Hall lawn, and of moving the fence back to, or placing some other structure to protect the lawn and also to confer with the proper authorities of the Congregational Church Society relative

to continuing the line across the land of said Society in line with south side of the Hook and Ladder House. This committee to report at a Town Meeting to be called not later than May 15, 1921.

The motion was carried and the Moderator appointed as the Committee the Selectmen and John Adams, Frank E. Potter, D. A. Matheson and Benj. A. Dyer.

At 10.55 the meeting adjourned to the lower hall for voting. It was voted to close the polls at 4 P. M.

One Member of the School Committee for three years.

Frank Chase, Ballot Clerk, received of the Town Clerk the ballots to be used at this meeting. The Tellers were supplied with lists of the registered voters of the town; the Ballot Box was shown to be empty, the register set at 0, it was locked and the key delivered to Constable Irving L. Rosenthal. The polls were declared open and kept open

Article Fourth. To see what action the Town will take to erect and maintain a street light on Young's Court near the premises of George E. Rich and appropriate money for the same.

It was voted to erect and maintain a street light on Young's Court near the premises of George E. Rich and appropriate \$25.00 for the same.

Article Two was taken from the table.

The report of the School Committee recommending an appropriation of \$35,000 for Public Schools, \$2,200 for Incidentals and Repairs and \$2,200 for Free Text Books and Supplies, was accepted.

Article Fifth. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$600 to help maintain the services of a nurse and the same to be expended under the direction of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the Visiting Nurse Association.

It was voted that the Town appropriate \$600 to help maintain the services of a nurse, and the same be expended under the direction of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.

Article Sixth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for and elect a Director for the Cape Cod Farm Bureau, as authorized by Sections 1 and 5, Chapter 273, Acts of the Massachusetts Legislature of 1918.

It was voted to appropriate \$150 for and elect a Director to the Cape Cod Farm Bureau. Katherine K. Manuel was elected Director.

Article Seventh. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of a Memorial to commemorate the services of the soldiers, sailors and marines who served the Country in War.

It was voted that a committee of five (5) be appointed

by the chair, to see what action the town will take, relative to Chapter 292 of the Acts of 1920, which is as follows: "An act authorizing cities and towns to appropriate money for Memorials to Soldiers, Sailors and Marines."

The Moderator appointed as the committee Frank A. Days, Jr., William B. Bangs, Clarence P. Curley, John A. Matheson, and Hersey D. Taylor.

Article Eighth. To see if the Town will erect and maintain a street light on Pleasant Street, between Bradford and Commercial Streets, and appropriate money for the same.

It was voted to erect and maintain a street light on Pleasant Street, between Bradford and Commercial Streets and appropriate \$25.00 for the same.

Article Tenth. To see what action the town will take to provide suitable headquarters for the American Legion Post, No. 71, and appropriate money for the same.

It was voted that a committee of three (3) be appointed to procure suitable headquarters for the American Legion Post No. 71, and that \$500 be appropriated for the purpose set forth in this article.

Said committee to consist of Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, the Commander of the G. A. R. and the Commander of the American Legion, and that said headquarters, rented or leased for the purpose as aforesaid, may be under the direction and control of said Post, subject, however, to such rules and regulations as may be fixed from time to time by the vote of the town.

Article Eleventh. To see what action the town will take towards requesting the Selectmen to revise the rates for the use of Town Hall.

Upon motion of Mr. Welsh it was voted that the Selectmen be requested to revise the rates for the use of Town Hall.

Article Twelfth. To see what action the town will take,

Also the tree which now stands on the said Society's property would have to be taken down; while your committee hesitate to recommend the destruction of any tree, yet the condition of this tree is such as to constitute a menace to person and property, and as such it should be removed.

The committee estimate that the moving of the Hook and Ladder House and the removal of the tree would cost about \$280.00.

While it may seem that the committee are exceeding the scope of their appointment in making any mention of the walk that now extends up to the front and side steps of Town Hall, they, the committee are constrained to include this feature as the word "widen" in the motion under which they were appointed would imply such authority.

Having built a walk as above described you should provide for one of like construction up to the front and side steps of the Hall so that all would be uniform. This could be accomplished by an expenditure of \$500.00.

Having attempted to set these facts forth clearly your committee would make the following recommendations:

First. That the fence that now stands on the edge of the walk be removed.

Second. That a walk 14 feet in width extending from Ryder Street to Adams' Pharmacy, having a curbing and metal edge as above described, on the outer edge, also a curbing on the inner edge as above described, be constructed.

Third. That the Hook and Ladder House be moved back and lowered as above described, and that whoever is authorized to carry out any such plan, be authorized to acquire in the name of the Town any land necessary to carry out the above.

Fourth. That the tree that has been referred to above be

removed and one corresponding to those on the Town Hall lawn be substituted.

Fifth. That the seats that have formerly been placed in front of the Hall be discontinued at such time as a more suitable place may be available.

Sixth. That the stone erected by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts commemorating the signing of the Compact be removed from its present location and tendered to the Provincetown Tercentenary Commission to be placed by them at such place as they may, in their discretion deem most suitable.

Seventh. That the Selectmen be authorized to carry out the above recommendations in conjunction with the Provincetown Tercentenary Commission, subject to such modifications as may be necessary to conform to said Commission's plans.

Eighth. That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to carry out the aforesaid recommendations.

In closing this report your committee would venture to suggest that at the appointment of any committee in the future, an appropriation be available to defray the expense of any expert or other assistance which such committee may require to give them the proper and necessary advice.

Your Committee appointed to consider and report on the question of erecting some suitable Memorial in behalf of our Sailors, Soldiers, and Marines have attended to their duty and submit the following report:

The question of a proper Memorial from all points of consideration is a wide and varied one, extending from a Flag Pole costing \$500 to Memorial Buildings and Arches, costing up to \$100,000 and over.

The most suitable Memorial for this Town, viewed from all angles cannot be hastily arrived at. We think it best to take plenty of time to arrive at a decision of this matter, so that what may be eventually done will be satisfactory to all.

When the Pilgrim Park System is finally settled, perhaps something in the way of a Memorial can be worked into the scheme, or adjacent thereto, which will be harmonious and fitting.

We recommend the rights of the American Legion take precedence in the use of the Caucus Hall free, for holding Meetings, Gatherings, Collations, Smoke Talks, or any other Entertainments, with Janitor Service, also the Kitchen and Cooking Utensils, and that any by-law, rule, or regulation, now existing, concerning the use of Town Hall, conflicting with these recommendations will become void, as far as the American Legion is concerned, on the acceptance of this report, and we also recommend that the Town appropriate not more than \$100 for the purchase of a suitable Cabinet for storing Flags, Regalia and other belongings of the Legion.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

To the Citizens of Provincetown:

The undersigned having been appointed as a Committee at the annual town meeting of 1920 herewith present the following report: Your Committee met and organized by electing Edwin N. Paine, Chairman, and Walter Welsh, Secretary. We have visited the High School building and made an investigation of existing conditions and are of the opinion that although the present building does not compare favorably with similar structures which have been erected during recent years, it is not in such a deplorable condition as many of our citizens have been led to believe and we are of the opinion that taking into consideration the financial condition of the town it would be unwise to procure a lot of land and erect a new High School building, but we do believe that some improvement should be made in the present heating system so as to make the present building satisfactory, and acting upon that theory we have procured advice and estimates of what is necessary for that purpose and we recommend the following:

That the present auxiliary hot water system be discontinued and a steam heating system be installed in place of the same, this latter system to be of sufficient heating capacity to properly heat the four recitation rooms in the northern part of the building and the room on the upper floor which is at present used for the typewriting class, and that electric lights be installed in the basement, and for these improvements we recommend that the sum of one

thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars be appropriated for the same, and that these improvements be made during the summer vacation.

Fire Alarm

The Town has been divided into three Fire Districts.

First. From West End to Court St.

Second. From Court St. to Johnson St.

Third. From Johnson St. to East End.

The Fire Alarm whistles will blow the regular fire alarm of four blasts, followed by one for the first district, two for the second district, and three for the third.

Apparatus

The apparatus we try to have in good order and ready for use. At present it consists of the following: one steam fire engine, one auto combination truck, one double tank chemical engine, one hose wagon, one ladder truck, six hose reels, and two hand engines in reserve.

Houses

The different houses of the department are in good repair and will only need the ordinary repairs and some painting that are usually required by such buildings to keep them so another year.

Hose

We have now on hand 8,200 ft. of 2 1-2 inch cotton rubber lined hose. This is sufficient for an entire change after a fire, 1,000 ft. is new, 1,000 ft. comparatively new, 5,300 ft. is good and 900 ft. is poor. No more hose is needed at present.

To the Citizens of Provincetown:

The Board of Health herewith submits its report for the year ending December 31, 1921.

We have used every precaution to protect and guard the health of the community and we believe the town is to be congratulated on the healthy condition which has existed during the year 1921.

We hope with your consent to establish a system whereby all rubbish will be collected from the dwellings of the inhabitants of the town; this system will conserve the health and give the town more health protection by eliminating many of the mosquitoes and we will have a more sanitary water front.

As the expenses of the Board of Health are increasing each year in proportion to the growth of the health work, we would recommend a six (6) months' trial of the above system for the current year, that is, from May 1st to Nov. 1st.

REPORT OF CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of Provincetown:

Your Cemetery Commissioners respectfully submit their report for the year ending December 31, 1921:

Cemetery No. 1. This is the oldest cemetery in town and we would like to have it looking as good as possible but in order to do so we must have the assistance of the townspeople. Every year we are obliged to make repairs that have been caused by someone's carelessness. The lots and avenues have been cleaned as far as our money would allow.

Cemetery No. 2, the Old Catholic Cemetery and the New Cemetery. We have done our usual work in the care of the lots and avenues in these cemeteries, have also hardened with ashes the avenues. Next year we expect to erect gates at the different entrances, to stop all unnecessary traffic. These gates will have a passageway for pedestrians but will be closed for teams. The key will be left with someone in authority.

We have contracted to extend and widen the New Cemetery on the north side. Because of the number of lots sold annually, we feel that this additional improvement is needed and when the contract is completed there will be 150 more lots. In 1921 we received \$120.00 for lots sold in this Cemetery. All money received from the New Cemetery is deposited in the Seamen's Savings Bank.

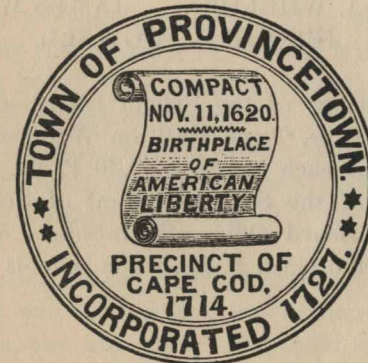

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

FOR SCHOOL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1921

Our schools have gone on as usual since last a report was made; little interruption through sickness and severe weather.

Vacancies in the teaching force have been filled. Our Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Pennell, resigned to take up work in another field. We feel very fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Fogwell.

This year just passed does not differ much from other years, the tendency is to get into a rut and then follow the rounded groove of least resistance. The objective ought not simply to be the keeping of the schools going but to make each year better than the year before, to graduate a class superior to its predecessor.

This means that each year the efficiency of our schools be increased and we hope that this present year will begin to bear fruit. Any changes that may be made will be to this end.

Recent legislation makes it obligatory to employ a school nurse who shall work under the supervision of the School Board and with our nine hundred pupils her entire time should be spent to good advantage. In former years a yearly inspection has been made with little follow-up work and while we were covering the law we were not doing all that should be done for the health of the citizen of tomorrow. A school nurse can find out why some children are not able to keep up with the class, whether too many

evenings at the "movies" with the resulting too little sleep or the reading of dime novels in bed.

A record should be kept of each child, weight, height, etc.

Money expended to keep from sickness is money well spent.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Provincetown:

I have been your superintendent of schools only a few weeks. Consequently my report will be very brief.

A man beginning his work in a strange town, under new conditions, facing the difficulty of understanding the community as a whole with its local educational problems, is greatly handicapped. He needs the help and cooperation of the townspeople. Every well-meaning citizen will gladly give the new man encouragement if he asks for it. I ask for it.

There is as a rule in every school system, much room for improvement—Provincetown is not an exception to the rule. In my short service with you I have observed some needs of the schools and have started to improve matters. Perhaps I may fail in my "renovations," but I will have the moral satisfaction of a man who has tried to do effective work. Some of the needs of the schools are as follows:

1. A Course of Study in the Grades.
2. A Course of Study in the High School.
3. Effective System of Kindly Discipline.
4. Extensive Repairs on High School Building.

These four requisites of the Provincetown school system should be—and will be—attended to at once. Number one, has been effected in so far as the completion of a course of study for the elementary schools is concerned. Within a few months we hope to institute an eight grade system

in the grades—a systematized well-balanced course of study.

Number two, may not be attempted this school year, because of the attention necessary in the elementary schools. However, it is possible that we may accomplish it.

That a rearrangement of the High School Curriculum is necessary is obvious to your committee and superintendent of schools.

Under three, much could be said. But I prefer to act instead of giving the usual line of talk. We have commenced to mend matters—both in the grades and high school. Tho there are many fine points in the discipline of the schools it is rather a fifty-fifty condition. A kind, but firm method of disciplining tends to help boys and girls to be better and cleaner members of society—and creates the proper type of American manhood and womanhood. Steps have already been taken in the right direction.

Item four, appears to be an old problem. If the town had plenty of financial resources I would advise the construction of a new high school building. But under the circumstances, from my standpoint, it would be unwise to burden our people with a debt of \$100,000 to \$150,000 that such a structure would cost. A better plan is to thoroughly repair the present structure and to build an extension to the plant when the need arises. This may be done at a saving of four-fifths the cost of a new building.

Report of Principal of High School

Mr. Jerome P. Fogwell, Superintendent of Schools:

Dear Sir: In compliance with your request I herewith submit my report as principal of the high school, this being my second annual report.

First in regard to the heating apparatus newly installed in the recitation rooms. It gives me great pleasure to report that it is serving its purpose in a very satisfactory manner. Although we have had no extremely cold weather yet the indications so far promise sufficient heat at all times.

The next point is the satisfaction it gives me to report the increased efficiency of the teaching staff in our school. The three new teachers show ability and interested devotedness and the entire teaching staff is working in a spirit of mutual helpfulness and harmony with results that naturally follow. A greatly improved morale in the school and in the attitude of the pupils towards the general welfare of the school and their interest in their studies is observed.

Last June we graduated a class of nine. One is in the Boston University Law School, one is in Holy Cross College, two in the Hyannis Normal School, and one in Miss Wheelock's Kindergarten Training School—not a bad showing for a class of nine graduates.

And I would not for one moment deplore the lives of increased usefulness that a high school training gives to those who are to fill positions in the various walks of life.

It seems desirable to speak of the athletic side of our school work.

Organized athletics have not in the past been a feature of the Provincetown High School. Last spring, however, a base ball team was organized in the school. Your principal took an active part in the training practice and contests

with other high schools on the Cape. The team was successful in many games. Enthusiasm ran so high and so interested the school that at the beginning of this school year an athletic association was organized which the majority of the pupils joined. The Provincetown High School is now a member of the Cape League to contend for the base ball championship in the spring.

Forty-two pupils entered the school in the fall giving us an unusually large freshman class. It gives me pleasure to report every member of the class taking Algebra instead of a number as last year, taking Commercial Arithmetic, apparently seeking something easy and losing the best part of a high school training. Also a number of last year's pupils are taking Algebra with the freshmen.

About one half of this freshman class elected Latin, the other half taking the Scientific Course. It can readily be seen that this arrangement makes large classes.

Our small recitation rooms are over-crowded and Miss Freeman teaches during every one of the seven recitation periods of the session. Your principal teaches six of the seven periods practically leaving no time for supervision.

A year ago the Helping Hand Society of Provincetown offered a prize of two hundred fifty dollars to be awarded to that member of the graduating class who in school work proved the most worthy and who would use the award in continuing studies in higher institutions of learning. This prize was awarded at the graduation last June to Cecelia Catherine Francis, who is now pursuing her studies in Boston University.

This year the Helping Hand Society has offered prizes amounting to three hundred dollars to be contended for by the class to graduate next June and to be awarded as follows:

Thirty, twenty-five, twenty, fifteen and ten dollars for those having the best marks in scholarship and deportment.

The winners of these prizes are eligible to apply for a greater prize of two hundred dollars to be used for advanced education only. The same to be decided by a committee of three on merits with the approval and co-operation of the teachers.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of your enthusiastic help and encouragement for myself and the High School staff of teachers in our work.

Report of Music Supervisor

Mr. Jerome P. Fogwell, Superintendent of Schools:

Dear Sir: I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Supervisor of Music in the schools of Provincetown.

Music improves the conduct of the children hence the ethical effect of music. There are the cultural, esthetic emotional, intellectual, social, physical and vocational values which when compared with other school values play an important part in developing the boy or girl. Music is given daily periods from fifteen to thirty minutes.

In every building the children have earned enough money to buy a Victrola which proves how strong music appeals to the youthful mind.

Besides the New Educational Music Course Readers we have added the Congdon Music Reader, Book III, for the third grades. This book is especially liked by the children as many of the songs have illustrations in the margins, and large notes. Since placing these books in the schools a year ago more intensive work has been done in the grade.

The sixth grades have the Progressive Music Course, Book III, arranged by such a well known musician as the late Horatio Parker, of Yale College. It is a delight to work with such material as we find within its covers. For instance, during the weeks preceding Christmas we are singing one of the arias from Handel's "Messiah." Such selections have appreciative and interpretative values which are emphasized and enjoyed by both pupil and teacher.

The Grammar School this year is getting more out of the study of music than before with an exceptionally well balanced chorus made up of about forty sopranos, twenty altos, twenty tenors, and twenty basses. With the present

system of music, introduced in the schools a year ago, pupils are able to read at sight pieces that usually had taken six mornings to learn. We are looking forward to good chorus work in the High School next year.

For the first time since the introduction of music in the Provincetown Schools the High School is giving a credit towards graduation for the music course.

Many scholars having a talent and love for music are encouraged along that line. To earn this credit examinations in Theory, Appreciation, Harmony and Chorus work are given throughout the year. Instead of one period a week we now have two, thus giving the study of Harmony and Appreciation a sufficient amount of time.

The chorus work in the High School is inspiring and enjoyed by the faculty as well as students. With the unusual talent shown public performances are possible. The senior class presented the Operetta, "The Pioneer's Papoose" last month.
