WHO'S WHO

Kevin Shenk (Dotty Otley: Mrs. Clackett) has "trod the boards" since the age of 6. Her credits include over 800 live TV performances of Kraft Playhouse Studio and a long running role on A Brighter Day. She made her Broadway debut in the original production of INHERIT THE WIND. After a 22 year hiatus to raise a family, the smell of grease paint once again called and she has recently apperared in a number of PTC productions including A THURBER CARNIVAL, LA RONDE, THE NIGHT OF THE IGUANA, THE DINING ROOM, and THREE BY TENNESSEE. This winter, she played Schmidt in the Provincetown Theatreworks production of EXECUTION OF JUSTICE. Her theatrical contributions also include the presidency of the P.A.P.A./Provincetown Theater Company for the past two years. As she would say: "Considering the efforts that have gone into moving into our two new spaces in the Provincetown Inn, producing PTC's REAL THING, and working with Michael Prevulsky, this year has certainly been one to remember!"

Vincent Philip (Lloyd Dallas: The Director) is from New York—the city of course! He was a member of the Cocteau Repertory Co. on the Bowery, where he performed in THE RIVALS, THE DUCHESS OF MALFI, OF MICE AND MEN, and as Plato in SOCRATES, THE THEATRE OF LIFE. Off Broadway, he played the part of "Dad" in THE LAST TANGO IN POMPEII. Vincent's stock performances include: THE SKIN OF OUR TEETH, CAT ON A HOT TIN ROOF, and the "beast" in BEAUTY AND THE BEAST. He is very happy to be working with the Provincetown Theatre Company, and PTC is delighted that he is with us.

André Z. Gere (Garry Lejeune: Roger Tramplemain), an Englishman, is currently residing in New York. His training includes Mime, Commedia de l'arte, Lee Strosberg Actors' Studio, and Sandra Lee. Andre's stage credits include Bruce in BEYOND THERAPY, Jim in YOU AND WHO ELSE, Horatio in HAMLET, Darnak (the baddy) in A FAR EASTERN TOUR OF THE FANTASY, THE SUPERMEN FROM THE PLANET ORION. His TV credits include DR. WHO and the EASTERNERS. NOISES OFF is his American stage debut.

Sandra Busa Hricko (Brooke Ashton: Vicki) is a psychiatric social worker who began her career in theater to help her work with children. Through her work with the Provincetown Theater Company, her theatrical involvement has run the gamut from competent production manager to proficient actress. She is currently the hostess of Continental Cable TV's OUTER CAPE HEALTH TALK.

Wendy Adams (Poppy Norton-Taylor: Assistant Stage Manager) is proud to be performing with the Provincetown Theater Company. Her recent credits include Princess of Eboli in a New York City production of DON CARLOS. She can be seen on the "big screen" in the feature film RELIGION, INC. in which she appears much larger than life--perhaps because her now six month old daughter, Rebecca, was then waiting for release.

James Forrest (Frederick Fellowes: Philip Brent/Sheikh) joined the Provincetown Theater Company this past winter as Max in its production of THE REAL THING. While attending college in Hong Kong, he was a member of a pantomime theatre group and has studied acting and improvisational theatre with several teachers in New York.

Sandy McGinn (Belinda Blair: Flavia Brent) has told us "What I enjoy most about being an actress, along with the actual performances is the delicate process of creating the character portrayed." Sandy has experienced a variety of these processes since being bitten by the acting bug in 1982. Kevin moved to Provincetown two years ago and has previously performed in the Provincetown Theatreworks productions of ISN'T IT ROMANTIC and EXECUTION OF JUSTICE.

Anthony Jackman (Selsdon Mowbray: Burglar) is a veteran actor who has worked in a number of PTC productions. He is often remembered as Eronius in A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE FORUM or as Nick in WHAT THE BUTLER SAW or St. Michael in JENNY ST. JOAN. "But enough of me . . ." he has told us. DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Farce is very serious business. It is the greatest challenge an actor can take on. It requires absolute truth and clarity even though your trousers may be around your ankles. It is not about looking for laughs. It is about playing actions and facing obstacles; about being "honest" on the stage. This where the humor lies: in our sharing the characters' frustrations over not getting what they want regardless how hard they try. To quote from the play THAT'S FARCE. THAT'S THEATRE. THAT'S LIFE.: NOISES OFF "...is a love letter to the stage and it is our joy to share it with you." First and formost this play is dedicated to Mary-Kevin Kelly.

British spoof about theater people

'Noises Off' held over a week

Good news! If you haven't seen the Provincetown Theater Company's proluction of "Noises Off" it's not too late.

The company has extended the run one nore week, today through Sunday. Curain time is 8 p.m. at the Provincetown nn.

"Noises Off" is a funny British spoof bout theater people. The program itself is a give-away. The insert lists the cast or the play, "Nothing On," featuring Dotty Otley who, according to the program, is making a "welcome return to the stage to create the role of Mrs. Clackett after playing Mrs. Hackett, Britain's most famous lollipop lady ('Ooh, I can't 'ardly 'old me lolly up!')"

Kevin Shenk is excellent as the pefuddled Dotty Otley, who mislays her plates of sardines, in and out of character, as the loyal servant, Mrs. Clackett. In true theatrical style, she is having an affair with one of the leading men, which creates a jealous melee in

"Dotty's" lover in "Nothing On" is played by one Garry Lejeune who was ecently nominated as "Best Male Newcomer under forty in any British ow-budget comedy film by readers of he Sun newspaper."

In "Nothing On," Lejeune plays Roger ramplemain, who attempts to seduce n attractive clerk with the revenue epartment by posing as the owner of an aronial country home.

Andre Gere gives an almost faultless erformance as the impetuous young acor, passionate and tempestuous. erhaps the ease with which Gere ssumes the role is, in part, because he

is an Englishman. "Noises Off" is his American stage debut.

Gere takes several falls, which he executes admirably. This young actor is full of energy, which is ideal for the part. In time to come, it will be interesting to see Gere work with restrained, interior characterizations.

Tramplemain's gamin in "Nothing On" is Brooke Ashton, probably best known, according to the program, "as the girl wearing nothing but 'good, honest, natural froth' in the Hauptbahnhofbrau lager commercial."

Brooke banks on her sexy body and terrific looks. Sandra Hricko plays the part with a big painted smile, lots of frowzy blonde hair, and alluring undies. She literally stops the show when she loses a contact lens in the middle of rehearsal and backs down the stairs to look for it. Two trim little buns and legs clad in black lace stockings are all that the audience can see.

All sorts of commotion ensues in "Nothing On" when the real owners return unexpectedly and interrupt Tramplemain's tryst. According to the program, Belinda Blair has "been on the stage since of the age of four, when she made her debut in Sinbad the Sailor." Her stage partner, Frederick Fellowes, "bowed to family tradition and joined the Osmosis Players. There followed successful seasons in Nairobi, Ventnor, and Southwold."

James Forrest as Fellowes and Sandy McGinn as Blair portray the somewhat prim yet affable British upper middle class, perhaps a trifle proper for the world of theater. But earnest. They are a nice foil to Gere and Shenk, who in Act 11 and 111 leave no mischief untried.

The cast is rounded out by Vincent Philip, who "directs" "Nothing On," Wendy Adams, who plays his assistant, Poppy, Kevin Todd, the stage manager, and Anthony Jackman, soused aging actor awarded a cameo appearance.

The actors work well together, and only Jackman seems uneasy with his part, neither ancient nor loose. The character of Selsdon Mowbray is prototyically funny, the old tippling actor who falls asleep behind the set, waiting for his cue. Jackman is too tight, and doesn't quite grasp the core of man living on past glories.

Act 1, with its extensive exposition, which is necessary to the following acts, does run a bit long. But then Act II, a true slapdash-behind-the-scenes pan-

tomine, spins by in one great long hysterical breath. By Act III, the entire company is at odds with one another and due to missed cues and intentional harassments, is forced to create an extemporaneous version of "Nothing On."

The play itself, by Michael Frayn, is extremely funny, especially to anyone who has every worked in theater. The revolving stage works well, although the set decoration in Act I and III is sparse. The 10-minute delay before curtain was careless, and the break between acts could be curtailed.

Otherwise, director Michael Prevulsky has mastered a most ambitious play, which should not be missed by any avid theater goer.
