

HOLLY HUGHES

Six years ago, Holly Hughes was perhaps best known as a member of the "NEA Four" -- artists whose grant funding was denied by the National Endowment for the Arts because of allegedly obscene content. However, Clit Notes is sure to introduce more people to Holly, who has been hailed by critics including The Chicago Tribune, which has called her "one of the most insightful, funny, and entertaining storytellers around." And Ms. magazine says, "Rarely have we been treated to a sharper nose for pleasure and a keener ambition to seize it."

Hughes is the Obie Award-winning author of The Well of Horniness, The Lady Dick, Dress Suits for Hire, and World Without End--in addition to being a target for the religious right and Senator Jesse Helms. She has been verbally attacked on the floor of the United States Congress and vilified by the conservative Rev. Donald Wildmon. Of her now-famous encounter with Helms and the NEA, Hughes says, "I applied for funding for a fellowship grant, so when they took away my money, they didn't even talk about my work. They talked about the fact that I was a dyke. It was a one-sentence discussion. [Then NEA chairman John Frohmeyer] said, 'Holly Hughes is a lesbian. Her work is of that genre.' End of discussion."

Of her role as a performance artist in a predominantly conservative political and sexual climate, Hughes comments, one level, I think all art can be read as political. This doesn't mean that every artist has a political point they want to drive home, but I'd be foolish to think--having been an artist caught up by the government in a political struggle--that any artist doesn't have a political dimension to [his or her] work. Not that I'm polemical. I'm trying to raise questions and discussions with the audience about sexuality, about desire, about being an outlaw and being part of a community."

Those who find Clit Notes shocking should know that she thinks talking about her work leaves her less vulnerable to "be[ing] dismissed because I'm likely to be outside of anyone's definition of the avant-garde." She continues, "I want people to love what I do for the reason I do: it isn't new. I didn't invent it. Nobody owns it.... I want to answer those who yawn, 'It's been done, by saying: 'Yes.' And it will again and again...." While her format may not be new, what Holly Hughes has to say, and certainly, how she says it, make this out-there, in-your-face writer and performer a valuable addition to modern American art.
