

"WHY A WOMEN'S FESTIVAL?

Suzanne Bennett, one of my mentors in theater, came to one of our festivals and remarked what a balanced blend of female and male playwrights we had. This was commendable but she also noticed that most of our directors were male, as were all the technicians. This was not a criticism but an observation about the state of theater in general. We started talking women in theater-Suzanne had recently completed a national index of women working in theater and very few theaters had female artistic directors, managing directors, resident playwrights, and directors. That regional theaters, not to mention Broadway, were hesitant to risk putting plays by women into their seasons for fear they would "limit, audience attendance", and that "women's subject matter" was not recognized as being economically feasible. It was a perfect opportunity to host a Women's Playwriting Festival, with panels featuring women working in the dramatic arts, plays by women, and almost exclusively directed by women, (we're still working on the crew). Even though PTC strives for balance and diversity, I thought a festival dedicated to plays by women, with women directors, and panels featuring women in leadership roles in theater would draw more attention to and celebrate women and their contributions to the dramatic arts. 




