# Editorial





# 4ootball

On September 5, a squad of 30 hopefuls reported for the initial practice of the '57 football season. The team was comprised of the following returning veterans: Captain George Mooney, Don Fiset, Bob Keane, Joe Taves, Don Murphy, Bill Patrick, Maurice Worth, Phil Prada and Larry Souza. First year men who made up in determination and drive what they lacked in experience were: Ed Turpin, Ron Lopes, Tom Days, Pete Dalpe, John Nunes, and Jack O'Donnell. This year also saw the rise of a Junior Varsity team composed of players in the 7th, 8th and 9th grades. About twenty five boys participated and should be ready for that big step to the varsity next year.

On September 28, Bourne High invaded Evans Field to initiate the P.H.S. football season. It was a clear, cool, crisp autumn day, perfect for football. During the 1st half, nothing of significance occurred with both teams feeling each other out and not making much yardage either way. The 3rd quarter opened with a bang as Bourne's passing game started to click and before the Orange and Black could compose themselves, the Canalmen had pushed over two T.D.'s, both on aerials. A fourth quarter penalty put Bourne deep in Provincetown territory and on an end sweep the Purple hit pay dirt once more. The score was 19-0. The Fishermen, now desperate, finally began to function and a series of 1st downs behind runs by Patrick, Worth and Prada put the Orange and Black on the Bourne two. Dalpe plunged over right guard from the two to give the Fishermen their 1st T.D. of the year. The conversion failed and the whistle ended the game at 19-6, Bourne's favor.

On another perfect day for football, Somerset High journeyed to the Cape-Tip to engage the Orange and Black gladiators. It was all a fleet-foot half-back by the name of Jim Rockliffe. He scored five times, on electrifying sprints composed of 90, 45, 35, and 10 yards. If it wasn't for that modern day Mercurien, Provincetown could have beaten their off Cape oppon-

Again and again the Fishermen ents. line stymied the Somerset offense but just as it looked as if we had them stopped, Rockliffe would break away for a score. Again, as in the previous game, the Orange and Black came alive in the fourth quarter. Aerials to Lopes and Murphy put us on the Somerset 15 and a 10 yard jaunt by Patrick advanced the pigskin to the 5. Worth bulled his way over from the 5 to give the Fishermen their only tally. The final whistle sounded and the score was 38-6. Don Fiset and Joe Taves played a superb game backing up the Orange and Black line.

On October 12th, long subdued Provincetown High broke halfback Bill Patrick loose for two touchdown gallops to scuttle invading Nantucket High 12-6. Patrick's first score came early in the first quarter on a stupendous 35 yard jaunt around his right end. Nothing of significance happened in the second period and the score at half time was 6-0. The third quarter opened with the Islanders kicking to Provincetown. On the first play from scrimmage, Patrick took a pitchout and raced to the Nantucket 5. However, the conversion was wide. On a series of short passes to Lopes and Murphy and rushes by Tom Souza, the ball was advanced to the Maroon and White 12. Patrick plunged across for the score but the conversion was wide. The final score was 19-18, in Falmouth's favor.

On November 12th, Provincetown High terminated their football season at Dennis-Yarmouth's memorial field. It was a hotly contested game and the Cape-Tippers fought to the last minute. The final score was 26-13, in Yarmouth's favor. Yarmouth's first score came on a fluke Provincetown punt that bounced crazily for 35 yards and was picked up by a Yarmouth

back who scampered over unmolested for a T.D. Provincetown's passing game began clicking and Lopes caught a pass that put the Orange and Black on the Yarmouth 40. Murphy grabbed one that put us on the 28 end. Prada, on a sensational catch, advanced the pigskin to the Green and White 10. Patrick, on one of his bull-like rushes. put the ball on the Yarmouth 2 and Worth took it over. The try for point was wide and made the score 6-6. The lack of scrimmage hurt us terrifically. We had to run our plays against dummies, a poor excuse for a hard hitting opponent. If we had a chance to scrimmage, we could have ironed out many of the flaws that slowed us instead of having them emerge in a game, when nothing could be done about them. Football is a man's game and unless some of the able-bodied men (?) of the high school get out on the gridiron and show what they're made of, Provincetown isn't going to have a team much longer. One consolation is the performance of the Junior Varsity. Those boys performed well under the conditions they were exposed to and the outlook is bright.
