














## JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

Richard Burhoe, Peter Codinha, Roger Hathaway, Robert Peters, and Nolan Williams displayed their physical ability on the football team.







#### SPIRIT AND MORALE HIGHLIGHT

With only twelve candidates reporting for practice, the 1959 football season at P. H. S. did not look promising.

Through the combined efforts of Mr. Leyden, Mr. Murphy, and our coach, Mr. Aresta, twenty-six football players were recruited.

Starting our practice scrimmage games a week and a half late and with a completely inexperienced team, we were far from being ready for our first game, but had to play it. Provincetown, once, one of the largest schools on the Cape, is now out classed by


Regional Schools, but even under these disadvantages, the football team made everyone proud of them through their fighting spirit.


#### BOYS' BASKETBALL




Our easiest victory was on January 22nd, when we were hosts to Sandwich High School romping them 63-31.

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


