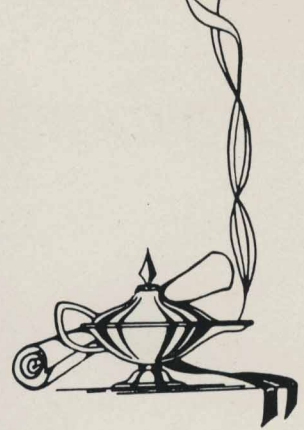

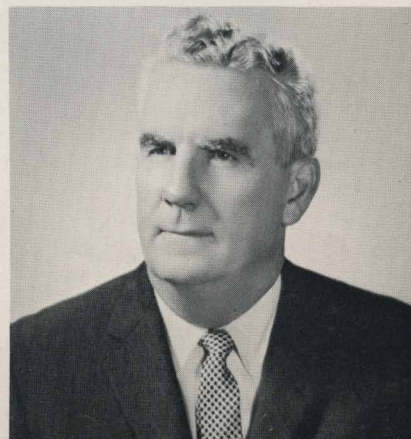
I wish to extend my heartiest congratulations to the members of the class of 1963 for having reached a milestone in their progress through life. Your class truly belongs to "the generation of promise."

"Our math student, Pete, is presently doing surveying at the NORTH Pole. As I recall, he was magnetically attracted in that direction."

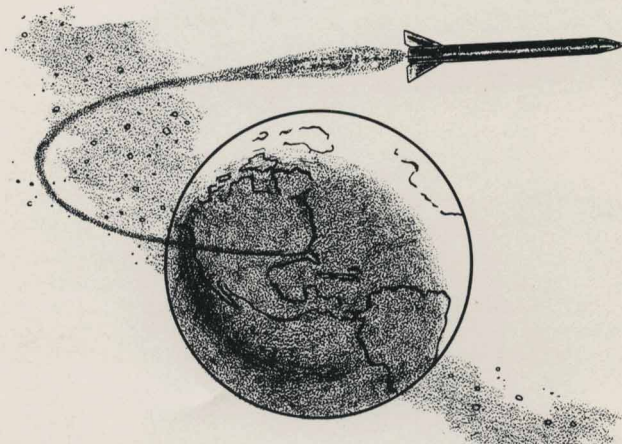

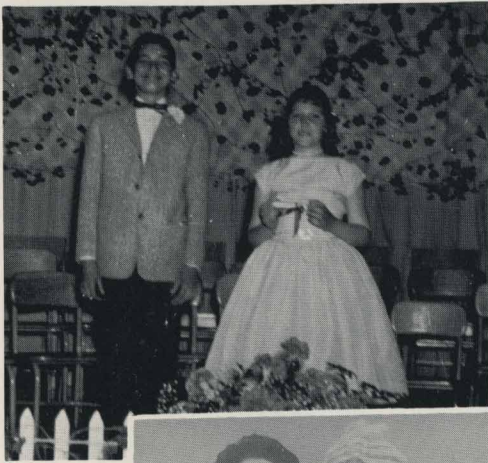
Now we had all summer to contemplate on a smooth third voyage for the crew of '64.

Answering to education's calls.

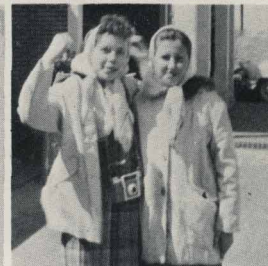

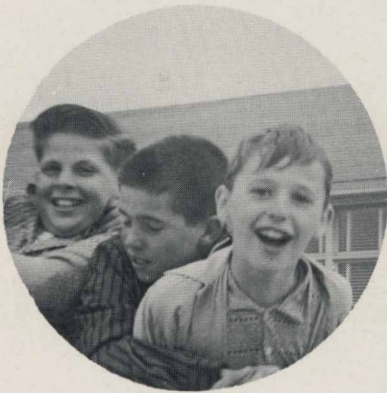
Our Freshman year is the first mile of the long road to graduation and with good leaders and guidance we will continue to the end.

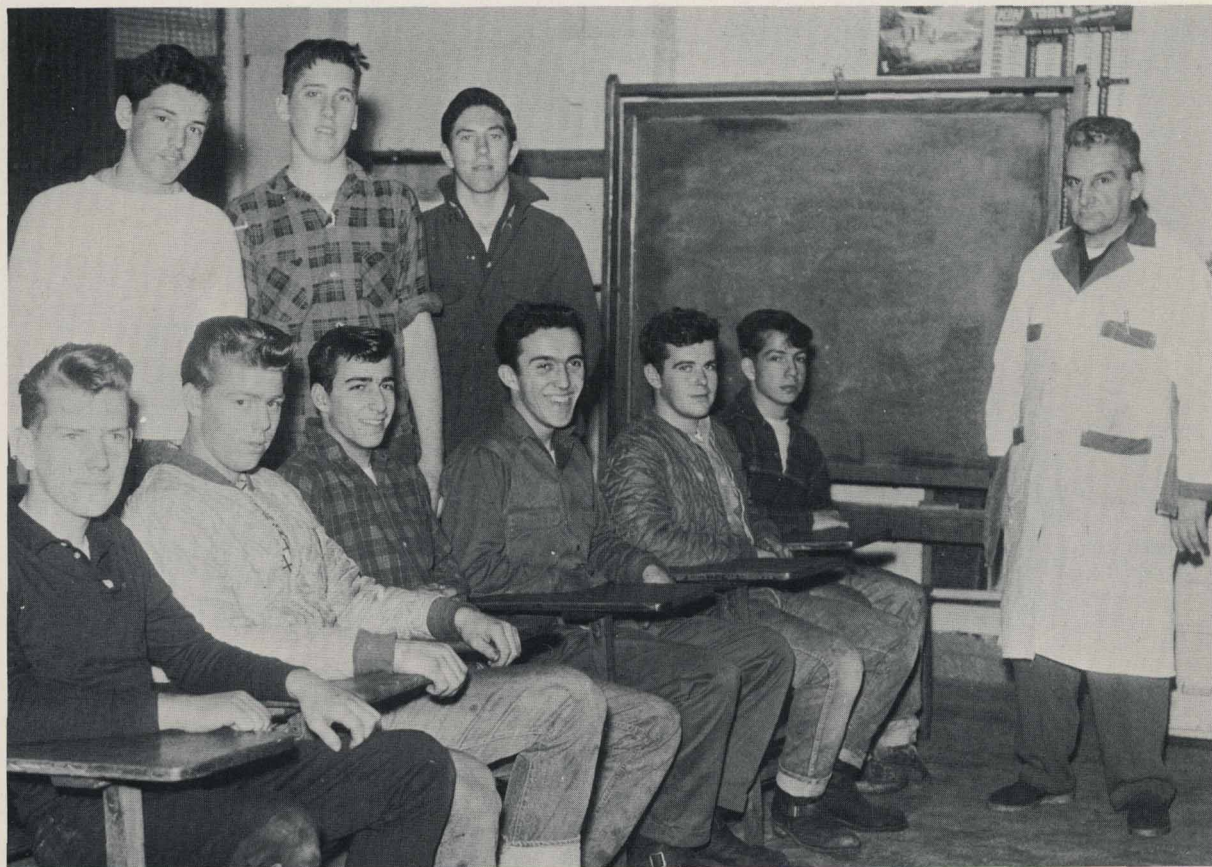

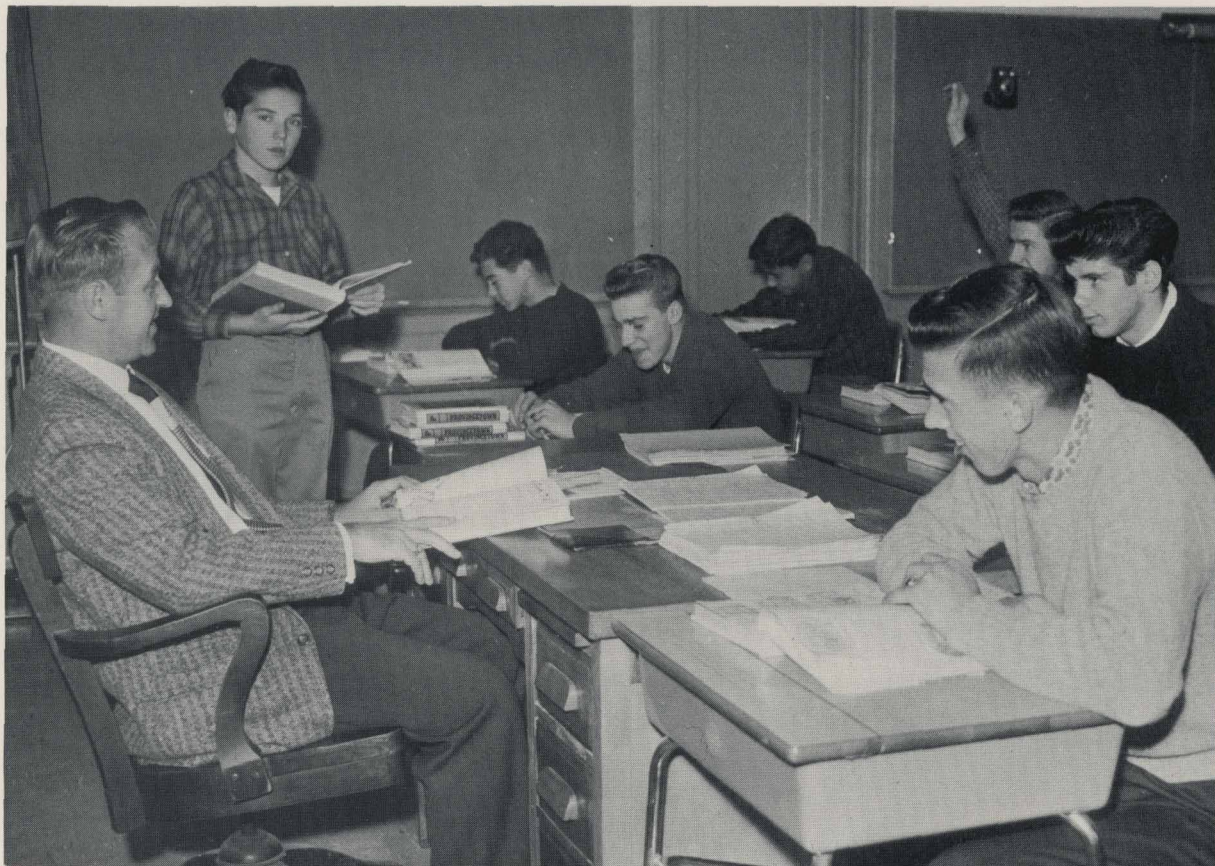


PROVINCETOWN VOCATIONAL SCHOOL
