## CURRICULUM

Provincetown High School offers five programs of study --technical and classical college preparatory, commercial, household arts, vocational, and general. These courses provide a diversified curriculum to meet the needs of all the students.

The college courses are planned so that they provide the student, each year, with a background in English, mathematics, history, science, and foreign languages. Success in this field gives each student the necessary credits to enter college.

The commercial course is designed to assist students in preparing themselves for further education in the field of business. Among the subjects offered are stenography, typing, bookkeeping, and business mathematics. These courses, if studied as a terminal course, enable the student to immediately begin work after graduation.


Two vocational courses are offered. Household arts teaches the basic fundamentals of homemaking. Through courses in cooking, sewing, history, mathematics, and English, the girls are prepared to be successful homemakers and assets to their communities. For the boys that are mechanically inclined, Provincetown High School offers a complete course in automotive training. After graduating from this course, a boy is qualified to obtain a position as a mechanic.


Another course offered is a general course which offers the student a more liberal high school education. The subjects included in the general course are arranged so that the student is sufficiently prepared for employment after graduation.

All these courses are flexible enough so that the students can choose electives in fields of personal interest, thus making a more rounded and stimulating curriculum. The physical well-being of the students is not neglected, for an extensive physical education program is required of each student.

Provincetown High School tries to instill in its students the ideals that will prepare them for future life and also enable them to be better assets to their community and their country.

## FOOTBALL 1965

Provincetown High School opened its 1965 football season, playing Hanover High at Evans field on Saturday, September 26. Led by Mike Walsh, Hanover's power-running halfback, Hanover defeated us 28-0.

The following Saturday we hosted Nantucket and defeated them 12-8, posting our first win of the season. With an Anthony Souza to Mike Rego pass and a beautifully executed trap play with David Oliver carrying, we managed to put 12 points on the scoreboard. Although Nantucket scored in the closing minutes, we held on for the win.

We were the home team for our next game, hosting Apponequet Regional High. This game proved to be a real cliff hanger. Behind 7-6 at half-time, we managed to pull it out of the fire with a Souza to Manny Motto touchdown toss. For the second consecutive game, our tough defense held on to win in the closing minutes of the encounter.

During our next game at Martha's Vineyard, we scored 22 points in one quarter, which proved to be our biggest offensive explosion. The first score was the result of a Souza to Motto pass. Tasha and Rego each managed to tally a touchdown to account for the big three in one quarter. Arthur Reis and Mike Rego eachreceived 2 points also; Reis on a Souza pass and Rego on an end sweep. Again, the defense held on and the final score read Provincetown 22, Martha's Vineyard 15.

The following Saturday, we again defeated Martha's Vineyard by a score of 22-0. Since this was our first shut-out and we controlled most of the action, it was definitely our best game. Souza hit Motto on a 45 -yard touchdown toss and swept the right end on a 21 yard touchdown jaunt. Mike Tasha scored the other touchdown on another sweep. Tasha and diminutive halfback Mike Santos each scored on two-point conversions.

In the final game of the season for both teams, Provincetown traveled to play its archrival, Dennis-Yarmouth Regional High School. In a hard-fought and well-played game, D-Y scored in the first half to take an early 8-0 lead. In the third quarter, we bounced back scoring on a Souza option play but Dennis-Yarmouth, scored again, and held on to win 14-6. We ended our season with a fine 6-2 record.
