

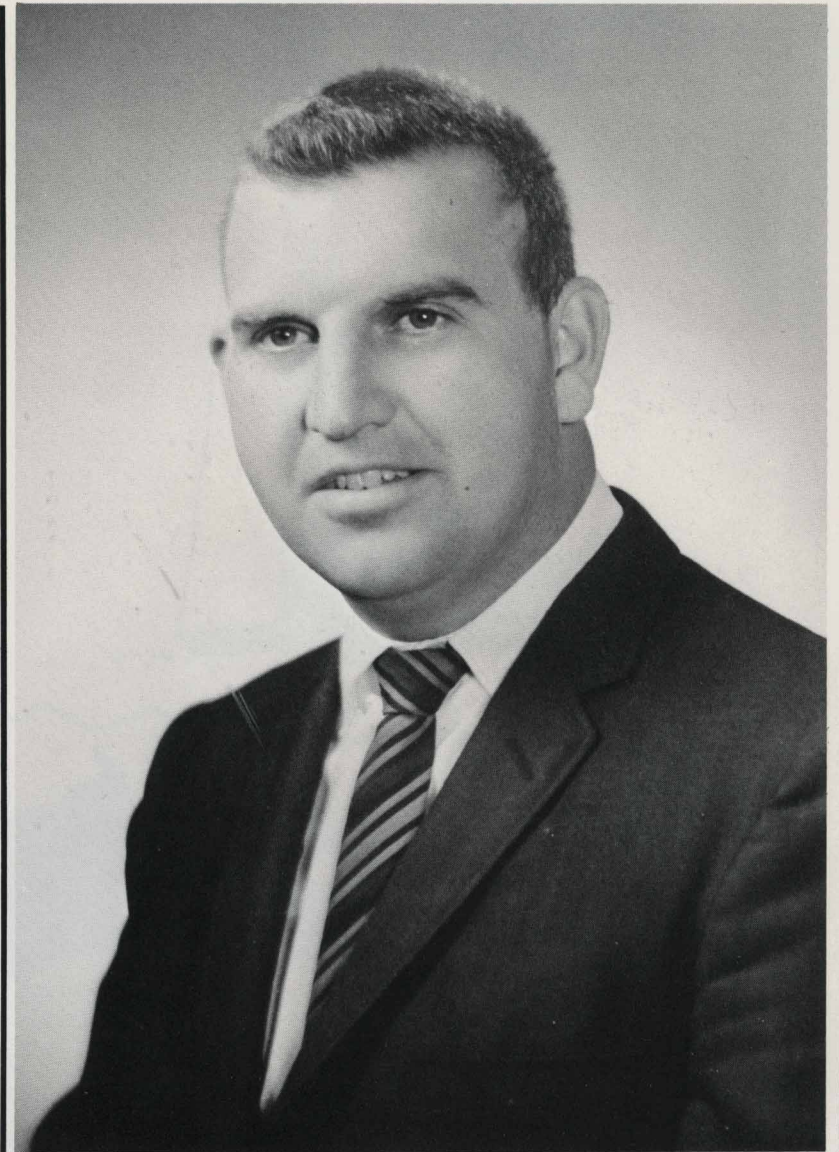

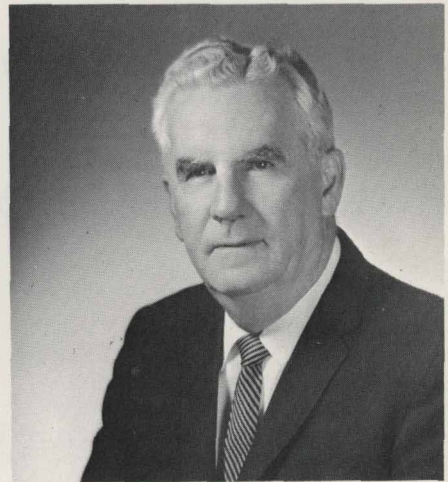
You have already demonstrated the qualities of sustained effort and ability which have culminated in your high school Commencement.

CURRICULUM

The curriculum at Provincetown High School, has, as its principal objective, the general education of its students which will enable them to take their place in society as knowledgeable citizens. The course of studies, too, has as its objective the preparation of each student for the path in life which he will choose to take upon graduation.

Students who select the College Technical Course are required to take subjects which are necessary for admission to any four year college or technical school for which they personally qualify. Four years of mathematics and science as well as two years of Technical Drawing are included in this course. The College Classical Course includes a concentration in foreign languages and history and prepares students for college programs in liberal arts and business administration.

The Commercial Course emphasizes training in office procedures and skills and equips a student for employment immediately upon graduation, if he so desires. Many students follow this training with a two year business college course.

The General Course gives our students a broad education with no specific concentration, and exposes students to various subjects which they may later choose to expand upon.

The Vocational Household Arts Course gives our girls training in cooking, sewing, and household management along with their academic subjects. The Vocational Automotive School trains our boys in the skills necessary for employment in the field of automobile maintenance.

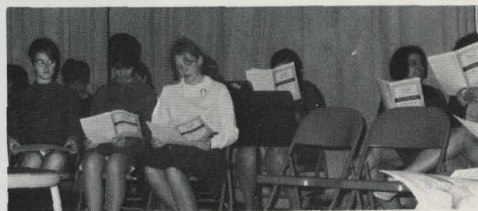


SENIORS

Pooling our efforts, we showed the school that our class members possessed talent, for we presented an amusing play and delivered distinguished speeches in our Freshman Assembly.

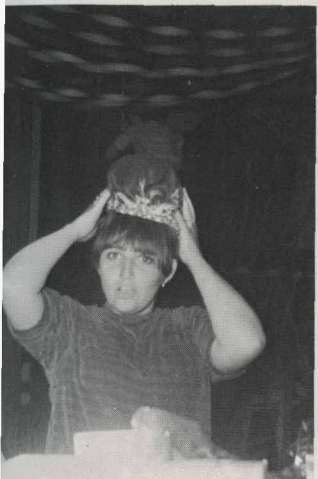
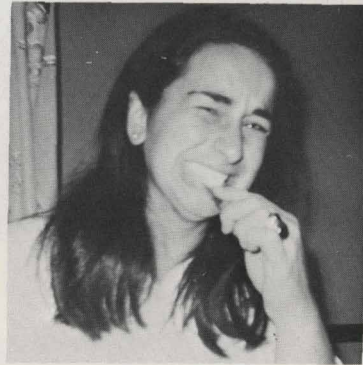
Our Freshman Reception, held at the Town Hall, was the social event of the season.

Recalling our freshman and sophomore years, we remember such events as the Freshman Reception, the fun of weekly dances, and the thrill of participating in sports.

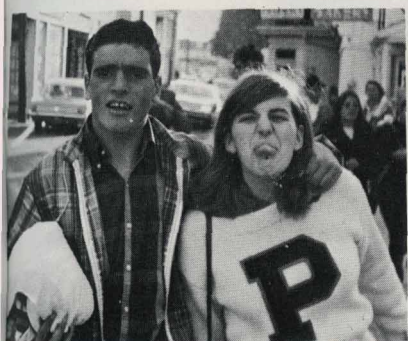
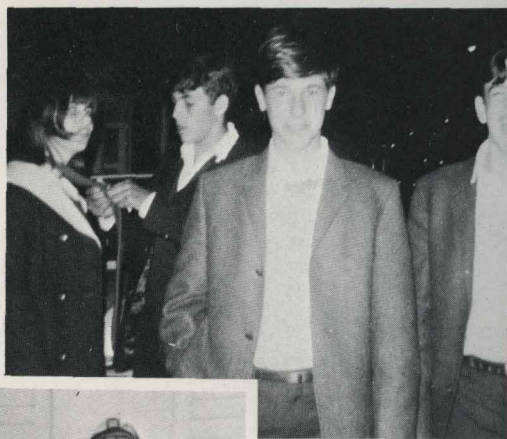

the spinsters live, is taken away by the police for the murder of her two colleagues. She has her revenge, though, as in the end we discover the death of Jane Rogers.

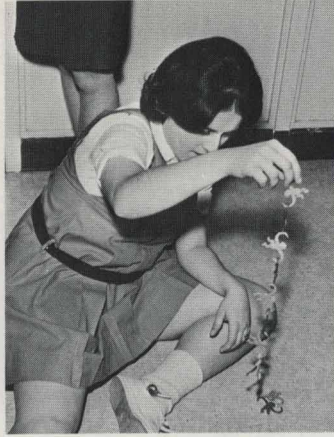

Our next game found us pitted against Harwich. They were ahead most of the way but in the final few minutes we emerged victors 49-45.

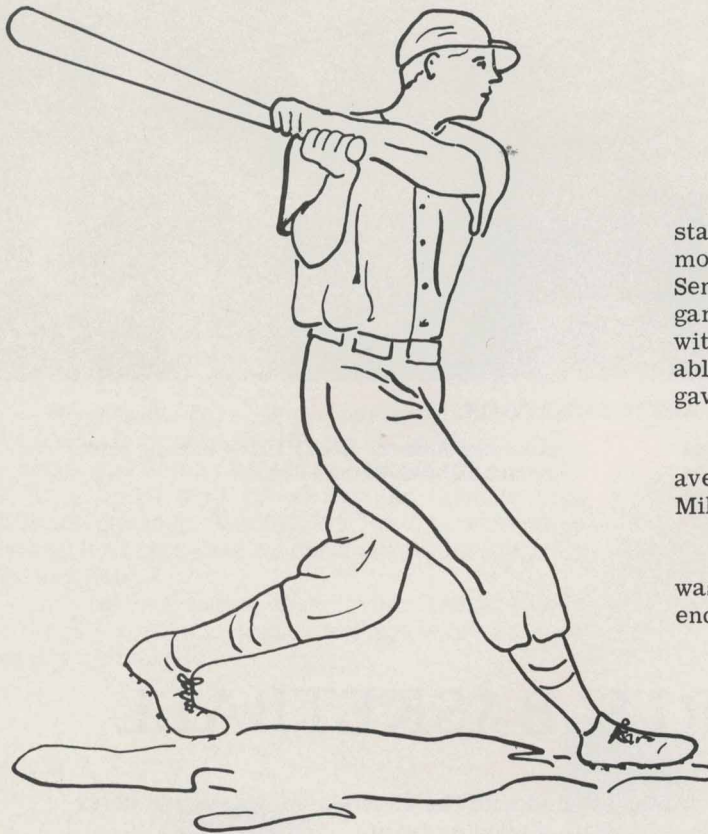
Barnstable fell our next victims as we defeated them 53-37.

Team Records First Winning Season

The Provincetown High School track team had its first winning season last year by defeating Dennis-Yarmouth three times, Nauset once, and Chatham once, while losing to Barnstable by a difference of one point, and Falmouth - for a final score of five victories against two losses. The team placed second to Chatham in the Lower Cape Championship.

For the first time in the history of track, Provincetown had a home meet. This proved to be a memorable day for the team members and spectators, as we defeated Dennis-Yarmouth.

Another first was the team's traveling to Belmont for the Belmont Relays. We placed in several events, competing against the best runners in the state.

Many records were broken last year.
