
It is my hope that the members of the Class of 1968 will make some contribution, whether great or small, to this great cause.

In attempting to educate every student at Provincetown High School, diverse programs are offered to him, from which he selects a course of study to which he is best suited. Although a Freshman in high school may anticipate his own development in a particular direction, he occasionally changes his goals and consequently his course. However, through a careful analysis of requirements for admission to Technical Schools, Colleges, and Business Schools our high school curriculum has been so organized as to satisfy the requirements for admission to institutions of higher education, or to prepare students for employment in many jobs available in the community following graduation.

Commercial Course students are prepared for a variety of office positions through the mastery of stenographic, typewriting, and bookkeeping skills.

Students in the College Courses are qualified for admission to four year colleges, two--year technical schools or junior colleges. Students in the College Technical Course are required to take a four year concentration in mathematics, four years of science as well as two years of Technical Drawing and foreign language. These courses are taken in addition to English and various electives. College Classical Course students are given an opportunity to select subjects from a wide choice of electives during their Senior year. For their first three years of high school, they have an opportunity to study both Latin and French, history, and mathematics and sciences. The addition of subjects such as Creative Writing, Marine Biology, Physiology, and Modern European History to our curriculum has enabled our students to delve into areas of knowledge according to their interests and goals in life.

Students who have been enrolled in the Vocational Automotive Course have been trained in the skills necessary for employment in the field of automobile maintenance.

The Vocational Household Arts Course gives our girls training in cooking, sewing, and household management, along with their academic subjects.

The General Course exposes students to a wide variety of subjects including mathematics, science, commercial electives, foreign languages and social studies.

The Industrial Arts Course which was initiated into our curriculum in September 1967, offers boys an opportunity to take subjects which will enable him upon graduation, to be absorbed as an apprentice in the technical field of his choice or to enter a technical school to be further trained in some specific area. Technical Drawing, power mechanics, electricity, metal work, and basic electronics will be included in this course, in addition to English, Mathematics, Science, and History.

EDITORIAL 1968 YEARBOOK


For three years-as Freshmen, as Sophomores, and as Juniors-we had anxiously looked forward to being Seniors. Now in 1968 the anticipation is a reality.






The most notable activity of that year was, of course, our memorable Freshman Reception, at which time we became formally accepted into the senior high and the seemingly long four years which lay ahead.

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY





VOCATIONAL SCHOOL







FUTURE TEACHERS OF AMERICA





Provincetown High School Senior Line Left to right: James Roderick, Jeff Thomas, Stephen Perry, Bernard Roderick, and F.J. Hurst.






