# An Individually Planned Curriculum 

Curriculum

The curriculum at Provincetown High School has been organized in a manner which permits every student to receive the best possible education based on his abilities, aptitudes, and post-high school plans.

Although students' schedules are prepared in accordance with specific course requirements, individual differences are given careful consideration and students are usually able to take those subjects which serve a definite purpose in their total school planning.

Members of the student body may pursue the College Classical Course, College Technical Course, Commercial Course, General Course, Household Arts Course, or Industrial Arts Course. However, by the time he reaches his Junior or Senior year, a student may elect major subjects which are not necessarily within his regular course division, if they serve a definite educational purpose.

In addition to taking the required English, Social Studies, Science, Mathematics and Physical Education courses necessary for graduation for all students, those students in the College Courses may take Solid Geometry, Trigonometry and Calculus, Physics, Creative Writing, Marine Biology, Technical Drawing, French and Latin. Commercial Course students have intensive training in a comprehensive sequence of Stenography, Typewriting, Bookkeeping, and Office Machine Operation, which equips them to hold an office position after graduation from high school. General Course students are allowed to select from a wide variety of electives, depending upon their interests and abilities. Industrial Arts Course students are required to take a sequence of including Technical Drawing, Woodworking, Metals, Electricity and Electronics. This course prepares boys for technical schools or for

Mrs. Anita Berman Guidance Counselor apprenticeships in technical or building fields, following high school. The Household Arts Course gives our girls valuable training in cooking, sewing and household management, in addition to wide choice of electives and basic academic subjects.

This year, three new partial unit subjects have been added to our curriculum. These are, Current Events in Grade 9, Family Living in Grade 10, and Health in grades 7 and 8. These are required subjects. Our high school students continue to elect Art, Band, and Chorus according to their interests and talents.

Judging from the list of colleges and schools which our graduates attend, it appears that our high school curriculum is fulfilling the demands of modern education in today's society.


## Editorial

During his four years of high school, a student is conscious of the sheltered life he leads; but he is also aware of the social, economic, and political problems that exist in the world today. Even though he seems to be occupied primarily with proms, parties, cokes at Adams', dances, and sports, he is far from ignorant of the racial problems, political and religious dissensions, or the war in Vietnam.

That a freshman is cognizant of the various problems in the world is somewhat difficult to believe. He is only fourteen, thrilled with his long hair and mod clothes. The girls who were once "brats" are now something to be admired. He can play sports, and makes friends quickly. To say that he doesn't know what is occurring ourside his comparatively small world is a gross injustice. He remembers the day when his brother joined the Air Force - his mother's tears, and his father's struggle to retain his composure - this was his initiation into life's complexities.

He becomes a sophomore. His parents relax some of their restrictions, and he becomes interested in cars and how they work. He becomes serious about his studies. He is very tall and lanky and is now one of the well-known school athletes. His year passes smoothly. It is his history and government classes that give him a better insight and understanding of America as it is today.

He has his sixteenth birthday. He is a junior. This year will bring all the things he has been looking forward to. Preparations for the Junior Prom are prominent. His sports record is well known. Yet, he can't get his driver's license as soon as he had expected, because today, teenagers are not trusted. Teenagers supposedly cause all the riots and demonstrations that he reads about in the newspaper. More and more, he realizes the tremendous problems that will confront him. He learns that life isn't all dances, sports, and driving a car, especially when he reads the telegram that informs his family that his brother, who has been wounded fighting in Vietnam, is coming home.

Senior year. He is sure that he will be happy to graduate, but everyone knows that he someday will have nostalgic feelings about his high school days. But now his problems increase - should he go to college, join one of the branches of military service, or look for a job? What course should he take to prepare himself for life? He's eighteen - time to sign up for the draft.

They think that he is just an average high school student who "doesn't realize the problems of today and tomorrow." Contrary to belief, he does realize-all too well. His high school training has molded his character. He has matured from a young freshman boy into a man. He has confidence in himself and in his ability to make the right decisions.
