
To the Seniors:







One of the highlights of our Junior year was our successful football concession stand, which was an enjoyable and remunerative class activity.



Industrial Arts Department

Industrial Arts Courses are offered to students from grades 7 through 12. Students in grades seven and eight are required to take two periods per week of classes. The material in these classes consists mainly of a variety of experiences in the areas of woodworking and metalworking. Technical Drawing is touched upon to help students in the area of planning.

The main objective of the four year program in the Industrial Arts course is to provide students with the opportunity to explore a large variety of technical fields. Students are required to take subjects such as technical drawing, woodworking, metalworking, power mechanics, electricity, and basic electronics, along with English, algebra, science and social studies.

After four years of study, an Industrial Art student is prepared to work as an apprentice under the guidance of a local carpenter, electrician, etc., or to enter a two year technical school to specialize in the area of his choice.

The Industrial Arts courses are also available as an elective to any of the students in grades nine through twelve, including girls as well as boys. Experiences in the shop areas usually consist of two or three periods per week on an elective basis. Some of these students are also allowed to take courses with the regular Industrial Arts students providing they can fit them into their individual schedules.

The Industrial Arts Course was started when the present senior class were freshmen. We are the first class to have completed four full years as Industrial Arts students. Some examples of school and community activities that we have been involved in are building a room for the Audio-Visual Aids Department, remodeling of the trophy case outside of the cafeteria, building of equipment for the Provincetown Fire Department for use in fire training, construction of storage buildings, construction of a student concession stand, and construction of a student store.

Mr. Ernest Carreiro, a former Industrial Arts Instructor, began this program four years ago. Mr. Jackson Hibbert worked with Mr. Carreiro as an Industrial Arts Instructor for two years. This year with changes in the high school faculty, we have three new instructors. Mr. Scott Deering is a full time instructor in the areas of metalworking, power mechanics and electricity, and electronics. Mr. Matt Abbott is a full time instructor in the areas of technical drawing, and woodworking, Miss Winifred Tickner is a part time instructor in the area of Technical Drawing. We sincerely hope that these instructors will continue to develop the Industrial Arts Program, and offer the student body the opportunity to become involved in activities that make up the necessary educational experiences.


As for our league standings, we are presently sitting in first place with a 5-0 record, followed very closely by Martha's Vineyard who is

Just how far our team will go this year is too early to determine but one thing is sure, Provincetown is once again a basketball power and the rewards of a championship are certainly within our reach.






