Here we are, Seniors at last! Our long awaited journey is almost at an end. But as we wait for this memorable journey to end, we must look back over the years; over the notable events which took place.

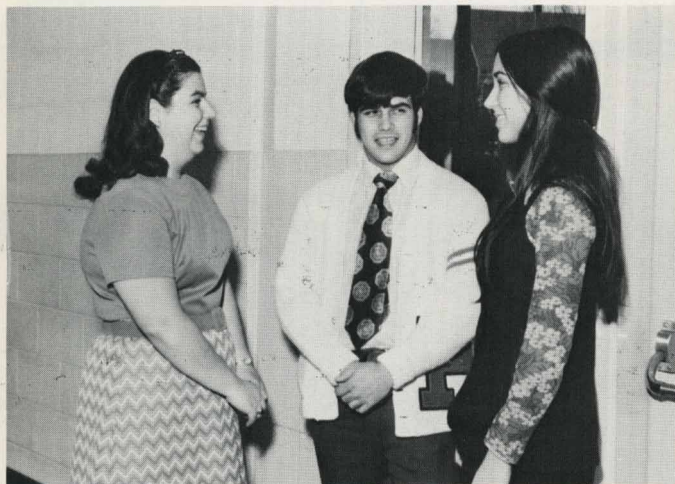

Remembering the past, enjoying the present, and anticipating the future is the basic foundation of the sophomore class, the Class of 1974!

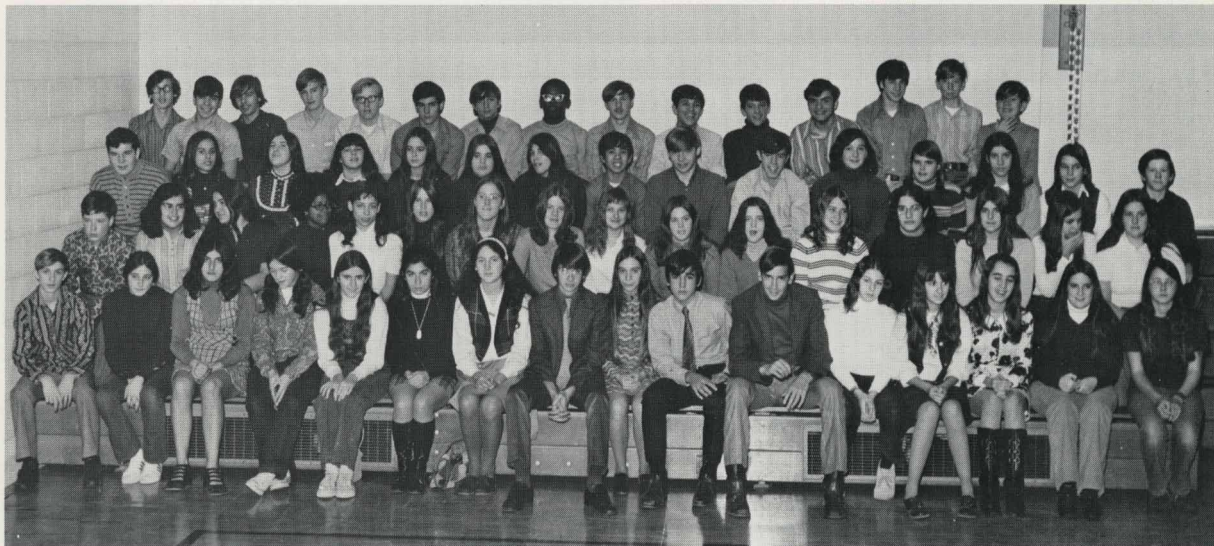

Industrial Arts



Since its inception five years ago, the Industrial Arts Department at Provincetown High School has come a long way. A variety of courses such as technical drawing, woodworking, metals, and power mechanics is now offered to the students.

The instructors involved are Mr. Fred Shaw, teaching architectural and technical drawing; Mr. Scott Deering, teaching metals, power mechanics, and electricity; and Mr. Matt Abbott, teaching woodworking.

Some of the other courses offered to both boys and girls on either a regular or elective basis are welding, machine work, structural boat building, furniture making, electricity, electronics, architectural design, and sheet metal working.

The initiation of the "mod" system has made it possible for more students to take any courses that their schedules allow.

In the Industrial Arts Department, the range of

projects is unlimited. Plans range from refinishing a forty-foot fishing boat in boat building class to engine overhauls in a dune buggy and numerous other vehicles in power mechanics.

From the Industrial Arts Department, a student can enroll in a two-year technical school or acquire a job immediately as an apprentice. Vocational schools in this area welcome students who have completed courses in their high school Industrial Arts Department. If a student has had a background in exploring various areas of the Industrial Arts Department, he can feel reasonably secure when he enters a vocational school or accepts a job in the outside world.

For the future, it is hopeful that the department will continue to expand, making courses more available to all and that creative motivation will continue to be the password.

Since Provincetown has the best possible facilities for sailing, this sport should continue to grow in popularity with help and enthusiastic support from the school and town.

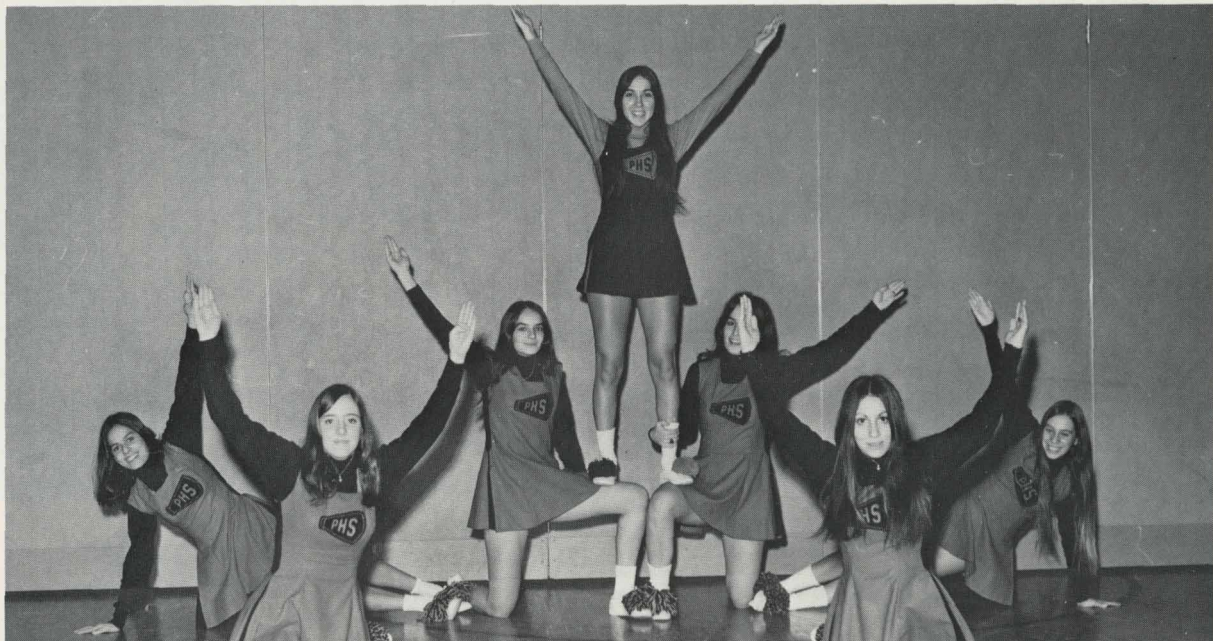
