Jack Davis and Antone Silva built the "Lewie Warren" in Gloucester.


Named for Jack's son Warren and Antone's son Lewis. Frank "Beganna" bought out Jack for Antone, his brother.


Lewie Warren lost at sea July 26, 1911 during a heavy gale of wind with all hands on a swordfishing trip. Supposedly the ice aboard shifted.




















Back in 1922, the Annie L. Spindler had been wrecked off of Race Point. A two-masted Nova Scotia schooner out of Lunenberg, its cargo was a load of liquor for the rum-running trade. It was not confiscated by the U.S. Government because it had come ashore by "an act of God." Local people, with horses and wagons, were put to work unloading and carting the cargo over the sand dunes to Provincetown and the authorities. Mysteriously, some of

the cargo disappeared during this process, and although the Canadian Government protested, it was never recovered.

The Spindler was my introduction to the shipwrecks left by the Cape's many storms. As youngsters we played on it for many years. The starboard shrouds, which hung loose from the mastheads, made wonderful


swings. With Father pushing us, we were able to swing out over the deck and over the beach.

The vessei had a poured concrete floor in its hold that served also as ballast. Its steering wheel remained aboard for many years much to our delight. With today's avid souvenir seekers it wouldn't have lasted overnight. In 1941, Holman, Billy Wiles and I removed the barrel-winch as it was just lying on the sand. I kept it as an outside decoration until it rotted away. The Spindler lasted longer than most of the Cape's shipwrecks as it was isolated from any water action and actually became more high and dry each year. Finally, a hurricane in


1944 succeeded in completely covering it up. It's still here though, under the sand.








MEMORIAL BAS RELIEF OF "SIGNING THE COMPACT". AT PROVINCETOWN, MASS. NOV. 11, 1620.













