108 Commercial St. is a 2-story, 4-bay, Colonial Revival-style 3/4 cottage; side-gable roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles, interior brick chimney at roof ridge, modern skylight; exterior is clad in wood shingles with wood corner boards, building sits on a brick foundation; fenestration includes single 6/6 wood DHS; primary entrance is accessed by a wood pane-and-panel door with a fanlight transom, an aluminum storm door, and inoperable shutters; entry sheltered by modern 1-story porch with 2nd-story balcony with wood balustrade supported by square columns; full-width shed addition on front roof slope.
