301 Commercial St. is a 1-story, 3-bay, Colonial Revival-style commercial building; gable-front roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles, full cornice return; exterior is clad in wood shingles with clapboard siding in gable, brick facing on bottom half of front façade wall; building sits on an obscured foundation; fenestration includes single-pane windows with aluminum frames and faux paneling above, single-pane wood casement window in gable with no glass, no windows on side façade; central doorway located in enclosed porch with exterior door missing and single-pane metal transom above.
