Loring, Chief of the Board of Engineers, 254 (FOMERLY 252) Commercial Street served as the Rescue Hook & Ladder Company #1. The original engine was built in Wellfleet, Mass. by the B.A. Ellison Co. in 1859. According to Jennings, the officers of the company as of January 1, 1890 were: James A. Small, Foreman; Joseph A. West, Assistant; and, Andrew T. Williams, Clerk. In 1993, the house ceased operation and commenced use as a Police Department substation for the summer season.
