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ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings in the community.

Currently "Provincetown Florist"; 136 Bradford Street is a 3-story, 2-bay building with a 1-story commercial addition at the front. The main house block has a bay window with brackets at the 2nd story level. Windows are 2/2 DHS. Shallow shed dormers in the mansard roof have simple wood trim, as do other windows in the building. Brackets line the eave beneath the mansard roof, and a frieze board is also present beneath the brackets. The 1-story commercial addition has a central entry flanked by large fixed-pane picture windows. This addition is extended to the side by an enclosure made of lattice. A brick chimney is located in the main roof.
