379 Commercial St. is a 2-1/2-story, 3-bay, ___; gable-front roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles, partial cornice returns; exterior is clad in staggered wood shingles with wood trim; building sits on a brick foundation; fenestration includes paired 6-pane wood casements, 2/1 wood DHS, storefront windows are single-pane vinyl with 4-pane transoms; inoperable paneled shutters; primary entrance is accessed by a wood pane-and-panel door; slight wall flare between 1st and 2nd stories; storefront has a pent eave supported by brackets; 1-story hipped-roof addition accessed by a large-pane door extends from side façade.
