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### ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION

377 Commercial St. is a 3-story, 3-bay, Greek Revival-style dwelling converted to residential use; gable-front roof is sheathed in asphalt shingles, wood cornice with partial returns, shed dormers, exterior brick chimney on side façade; exterior is clad in wood shingles with brick facing on side façade; building sits on a brick foundation; fenestration includes replacement casements throughout, plate glass display windows; primary entrance in center bay is accessed by paired large-pane doors; pent eave over 2nd-story windows (front); 1st-story pent eave with wood shingles; exterior staircase on rear façade provides access to 2nd story.
