243 Bradford Street is a 1 1/2-story, 3-bay, Astylistic dwelling; the roof is front gable with an interior brick chimney; the exterior is clad in wood shingles with a band of staggered shingles on front façade, corner boards and the foundation is poured concrete; the fenestration includes 6/1 wood DHS, operable shutters with anchor-shaped cut-outs and the west façade windows have 4-light wood storms (appear 2/2); the primary entrance contains a pane and panel door with a simple wood surround is accessed by a deck and wood steps; lattice on front deck
