274 Bradford Street is a 1-story, 3-bay, Colonial Revival-style dwelling; the side gable roof is clad in wood shingles; the exterior is clad in wood shingles and the foundation is concrete block; the fenestration includes 6/1 DHS with 4-light wood storms, a hipped roofed canted bay window is located on the east façade; the primary entrance consists of a pane and panel door with a gabled entry porch with partial returns, Doric columns and curved frieze with brick stoop and wood deck, a secondary entrance on the rear façade contains a wooden deck
