




EDITORIAL



Since our class colors were blue and white, plans for the decorations were made in the form of silver evening stars, blue and white crepe paper, and multi-colored angels.



Our assembly programs have proved educational, informative, and entertaining for both the student body and the faculty.



In December of this year, all prospective candidates were eager to launch another basketball season. We looked forward to a highly successful season.




